DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

ROGERDEL is a two and one-half storey frame house in the Queen Anne style of ca. 1900. Oriented to the road and facing west, the main block is three bays in width, four in depth; a wing of equal height extends two bays to the rear behind the south end; another wing of equal height extends one long bay to the north; and a low shed-roofed one storey wing extends north from the taller north wing. A one storey porch extends across the west and south sides of the main block, breaking out on the west side to form a porte cochere. Exterior walls of the first storey are covered with narrow weatherboards; second storey walls are covered with shingles which are slightly splayed above the small cornice which marks the second floor line; shingles also cover the gables and the single dormer of the west roof. Gable and dormer shingles are arranged in semi-circular courses.

Typical windows are 1/1 with louvred blinds; the northerly window west front in the second storey is lowered to express the staircase landing within. There is no entrance in the west front now, the principal entrance being in the west bay of the south end; traces of a former entrance are suggested in the weatherboarding and many alterations within allow this conjecture.

Interior detailing is simple, largely contemporary with the original construction but with many compatible minor alterations.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The property on which Rogerdel was built was the source of a court proceeding. Nathan Rogers Bayly as guardian for his infant sister Fanny BAYly, had transferred to Charles Rogers, the six acres which formerly Charles Rgoers had left to Fanny Bayly. Four years later, the litigation was resolved¹, when Benzinger, a court appointed trustee sold a considerable amount of both of their holdings to General Felix Agnus for \$14,2 195. The Atlas of 1898 shows no house on this proerty at that time.² Soon thereafter, Agnus had the land platted and called the development Rogerdel³. Rogerdel, its lots and its roads, appear on the 1915 Atlas of Baltimore County, though no house is documented⁴. Annabel avenue⁵ was to have run perpendicular to and intersect Green Spring Avenue⁶. It was at this intersection that a house was built.

Around 1920, this house was rented by Mr. and Mrs. Adgate Duer. Several years later, the Duers bought this from General Agnus, the property being listed in the deed as Lots 79, 80, 81, 82, and 83, on Annabel Ave. In the 1920's, the living room was enlarged and one upstairs bedroom added.

The house passed through several hands, and was bought by the Moores in 1969. In the mid 70's the kitchen was remodeled and a downstairs study added, Mrs. Moore is presently the head of the Middle School at Garrison Forrest School.


