DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

LOCHINVAR is built in a castle-style, one storey in height with stuccoed exterior walls. Dating from the early twentieth century, the symmetry and stylized details recall the castle style of the Adam brothers in late eighteenth century Scotland. The principal entrance, centered in the south front, is recessed within a deep four-centered arch. A crenelated parapet shields the steep roof above it, spanning between two small semi-octagonal turrets, each with crenelated parapets, narrow windows in each side. A 9/9 window is next to each of the turrets which flank the entrance and broader octagonal turrets rise at each of the front corners, their crenelated parapets not quite as high as those of the turrets flanking the entrance. A long wing extends to the north behind the westerly portion of the front section and a service wing extends across its north end, parallel to the front section, and similar octagonal turrets are at each of its north-erly corners. Turret windows have leaded diamond glass.

Interior detailing is quite simple, much of it recalling simple Colonial-revival forms. A wide center hall is within the principal entrance, a fireplace on its west side. A wide doorway opens into a large parlor to the east. A large "great hall" is in the east side of the north wing, the fireplace on its west wall having a medieval-style tapered chimney breast with a travertine mantel. The dining room is the northeast room, and like its counter-parts in the south wing it has an octagonal turret at its northeast corner with leaded glass windows. A narrow hall west of the "great hall" serves several bedrooms on the west side of the north wing. A cellar extends beneath the entire house, its walls of stone; the first floor framing is of circular-sawn wood.

Southwest of the house is a small chapel of stuccoed poured concrete, the whole now approaching a ruinous condition. The principal entrance is in the east gable end, facing the lawn, quadruple doors have chamfered rails and stiles with wainscot panels. At the west end is a single round-arched window. On either side wall, high beneath the wide eaves of the steep gabled roof, is a low rectangular window. The interior is empty of all furnishings. Two steps recall the former chancel at the west end and a label lintel is above the arched west window. Fragments of leaded glass remain in the side windows, elongated diamonds of creamy opalescent glass set within a red border. The underside of

the steep roof is plastered to the ridge and tie beams are exposed. Painted on the ceiling, in a medieval letterstyle, are two inscriptions, one on either slope, interrupted by fallen plaster:

Saviour like a Shepherd lead us
Much we need thy ----- care

and

Loving Shepherd ---- the
Keep thy lambs in safety keep

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Dating from the early twentieth century, LOCHINVAR is a picturesque and romantic re-creation of a medieval castle, its name recalling its Scottish associations. The picturesque chapel, now ruinous, was a vital part of this re-creation.

LOCHINVAR

Lochinvar was originally built about 1910.¹ It burned down in 1915 and was rebuilt one year later. The original building was assessed for \$9,000. The new building for \$14,400.

The house and adjacent land is now owned by Garrison Forest School and is used as living quarters for the Headmistress and her family.²
