HEDRICK HOUSE/ BADDERS HOUSE

1869-1876

MARYLAND LINE

George Hedrick probably built this double house first found in the 1876 tax ledger, shortly after buying the lot in 1869. The house is of vernacular, almost astylar construction, built of frame with two separate cross-gables facing the street. The main roof is an irregular mixture of gable and shed surfaces. The house has a 36-foot street frontage, six bays wide, incorporating large floor-to-ceiling windows typical of its period. For a time, the house was split into two ownerships, but in 1941 both halves were acquired by Allen B. and Blanche A. Bull. The present owner, Dennis C. Badders acquired it in 1978. The house is immediately south of the former Knights of Pythias Hall.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hedrick Duplex or Badders House is a primitive double structure with two cross-gables. The house is vernacular or astylar, built of frame, incorporating elements available to builders in the Victorian period. It measured 36 by 38 in earlier tax records, the 36-foot dimension being the street frontage.

The main facade is six bays at first-story level, where there is a full-width shed-roofed porch, its concrete deck two steps above grade. Each half of the house has a central door, and presumably a center-hall plan. Doors are contemporary, constructed of metal and large panes of glass. The windows are almost floor-to-ceiling types, 2-over-2 double-hung sash types in the four bays surrounding the entrances. The porch is supported by five plain, square wooden posts. There is a plain, almost crude, architrave and cornice under the porch roofing.

At second-story level of the main facade, there are four bays with standard-sized 2-over-2 double-hung sash windows. Each half house is framed by the shallow eaves of the cross-gables. The gable ends or pediments are windowless, filled in with shingling.

The cross-gables emerge from a main roof that presents its own gable end on the north (pointing at the side walls of the lodge hall on the lot to the north). On the south, the main roof slopes away and merges with the roofing over the south duplex.

The house is four bays deep along the sides, functional and uninteresting in the arrangement of its windows. The southern half-house is shown by aerial surveys as slightly longer than its "twin," giving the entire assemblage an L-shape.

Roofing material is rectangular blue-green rubber tiles on the porch roof, worn-down fish-scale pattern rubber tiles on the main roof. Two chimneys are irregularly spaced, one to serve each section.

Outer wall covering is white composition shingle. Foundation is stone. Behind the slightly longer duplex section, the southern one, is a plain frame outbuilding or garage close to the rear of the house and aligned with it.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This unusual house with its twin gable roofs facing the York Road was probably built between April 1869, when George W. Hedrick bought 26 square perches from Dr. Ephraim Bell, and 1876, when George Hedrick is found with a "House and Lot in New Market" on that year's tax ledger. (1, 2)

The Hedrick house is also shown in the 1877 atlas. The 1876 tax ledger also charged Hedrick with "Stock in Trade Lumber," one hog and a promissory note valued at \$150. This was the first structure south of the Knights of Pythias Hall. Hedrick was missing from the 1878 business directory.

In 1893, Hedrick and wife sold to Thomas G. Rutledge for \$500. The name of the tract was part of "Spark's Folly." (3)

Rutledge's executors sold the place in 1900 to Georganna Hutchins and the deed mentioned a right to a 13-foot alley and also a fence. (4) The 1911 Tax Ledger valued the Georganna Hutchins house at \$800. (5) The 1918 Tax Ledger showed Mrs. Hutchins with one-sixth acre adjoining the I.O.O.F. Hall (sic) and a:

Dwelling 36 x 38 2 stories \$1,111. (6)

The same tax ledger showed by a notation made in 1920 that Mrs. Hutchins had sold the north half of a double house to "Hoffheiser" and the south half to "Waltermayer." Each party received a one-twelfth acre and \$555 worth of improvements, as they were then assessed.

The partial owners were Ross L. Waltemyer and Charles H. Hoffheiser. (7) In 1938, Hoffheiser bought Waltemyer's portion of the house, and in 1941 sold the entire structure to Allen B. and Blanche A. Bull in 1959. (8) The Bulls sold both lots and the "double house" to Dennis C. Badders in 1978. (9)


