HELB HOUSE (UPPER)/ SPICER HOUSE

1881-1896

PARKTON

PRIVATE

This is the uppermost of the three houses that were originally identical, known as Chestnut Row. The land was put on the market as lots in 1881 and the first proof of the existence of improvements is in the 1896 tax ledger when Frederick Helb had four frame houses. Two of the houses (18,907-18-909) belonged to George and Lydia Hartenstein in the early part of the century. In 1924, this upper house was sold to Clarence M. Spicer, a railroad employee. Both Spicer and his wife were killed in an auto accident in the late 1970s. This vernacular structure is covered with a grey rubber shingling. Roofing is corrugated steel.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Helb House (Upper) or Spicer house is similar to the other two built as a set and stands on the hill north of Park-ton, the house facing west. This is a two-story plus attic, gable-roofed, vernacular structure four bays wide by two bays deep, a frame and clapboard duplex now covered with rubber shingling or siding of a light grey tone imprinted with a brick pattern. The two entrance doors are clustered in the two center bays. There is a full-width, hip-roofed front porch supported by four square posts. Windows are 6-over-6 double-hung sash types without shutters. All bays in both stories and in the two-bay depth of each of the side walls are supplied with windows of this type.

The two small, square windows in each gable peak contain four lights.

The rear of the house is three bays across and somewhat irregularly fenestrated with the same type of 6-over-6 win-dows. There is a one-story shed roof over the walk-in en-trance to the basement, which opens at ground level in the rear due to the steep slope from the highway level at the front of the house.

Foundation is stone. Roofing material is corrugated steel. The eaves overhang noticeably and there are prominent eave returns. There is a brick inside end-chimney at the north end of the house.

A picket fence runs in front of the house and there is a shed-roofed, wooden poultry house painted red in the rear yard, as well as other small, frame dependencies.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is the uppermost of three houses that were originally identical, built of once plentiful chestnut plank, and according to an adjoining landowner, was called "Chestnut Row." (1)

The land here was part of the timbering tract owned until 1880 by Christoff Kolter, who became insolvent. In the early 1880s, some of the timberland came on the market as town lots, and Frederick Helb, who was involved in settling Kolter's affairs, acquired this lot in 1881 for \$180; the deed described it as adjoining Patrick Kelly's property. (2)

The 1896 tax ledger charged Helb with "4 frame houses on York Road at Parkton @ \$700," a total of \$2800 worth of improvements. Helb was described as a resident of Railroad Post Office, York County, Pennsylvania. (3)

In 1905, Helb died, and his executors Edward Helb and Julius C. Helb sold the uppermost lot to Edward Helb as an individual. (4) They sold the two lower lots to Lydia Hartenstein; tax ledgers allow us to deduce that Mr. and Mrs. George Hartenstein (it is spelled several ways) owned the houses that have in recent years been assigned the street numbers 18,907 and 18,909 York Road. (5)

Frederick Helb had been engaged in a number of businesses as well as farming and his will mentioned among his Pennsylvania properties "hides and bark in the tannery." (6) He had also been shown as owner of a sawmill somewhere on the westside of York Road between the towns of Maryland Line and Parkton on the 226 acres charged to his account in the 1896 tax ledger of this district.

The 1911 tax ledger showed that Edward Helb owned one house on the eastside of York Road in Parkton, with one dwelling worth \$800 and another worth \$1000. (7)

The 1918 tax ledger showed Helb with two houses, but one of them was some distance away and soon thereafter sold.

His house on a lot "adjoining Jacob C. Stiffler" measured 24 x 32 and was two stories high, making it a twin, or "triplet" of the two houses at that time in the hands of the Hartensteins. (8, 9).

These houses had appeared in the Bromley atlas of 1915. In 1924, Edward Helb and wife conveyed this property they had owned for twenty years to Clarence M. Spicer and wife. The house is still recorded under that deed number. (10)

Mr. Spicer was a life-long railroad employee, but in his youth, before the State took over ownership of the York Road, he helped the turnpike company's gatekeeper collect the tolls. Both Spicer and his wife were killed in an auto accident in the late 1970s. (11)






