The Howard Leedy house sits on the northeast corner of the intersection of Maple Drive and Woodberry Place, in the town of Franklinville. The house is a four bay, frame dwelling, with a gable end roof, running east to west, currently covered with modern siding and roofed with asbestos shingle. A centrally located large chimney exits at the ridge. It sits on a high, uncoursed, fieldstone foundation, the slope of the land necessitating the foundation's height. This is known as a "bankhouse" construction. The south or main facade has four bays on the first level - from east to west door, window, window, door. The westernmost door is the present entrance, and is covered with a shed-roof portico. The two windows are six-over-six sash, evenly placed. A three-light casement window vents the basement. The west facade is blind. The north facade, built into a bank, has four bays, a door at east and west end, and six over six windows venting middle bays. The second level has four evenly placed six over six sash windows, the upper story, two one over one sash windows. The eastern facade is blind.

The first and second floor plans are the same - two rooms on each floor, with a central staircase enclosed by a partition, with two doors opening into each room. The house has been extensively remodeled; the basement however, is in basically original condition. It has a dirt floor, and a central fireplace (or possibly two), suggesting that it once served as a kitchen.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

This Franklinville workers house represents an example of a company-owned mill town community, planned and built by the company and arranged so that several groups of people could live within the house together. The houses of Woodberry Place are represented on a petition for a new road through the town, dating from 1833. The Leedy house was probably built a year or two before its mention here. The houses and the mill which owned them created a closed community, closely resembling the many similar mill-towns which operated along the eastern seaboard during the early-to-mid nineteenth century. Operating under various names, including the Franklinville Mills and the Oak Tire and Rubber Company, a mill had been on the site since the early 1800's. An 1882 transfer book specifically lists the number and style of the worker's houses: "twelve double-houses" \$450 each. The 1857 Taylor map shows the houses in Franklinville that were on Woodberry Place but not those on Maple Drive, thus setting the date for Maple Drive somewhere between 1857 and the Hopkins Map date of 1877, where the Maple Drive houses do appear.

CHAIN OF TITLE

While there is no deed reference available, the house was previously owned by a Mr. and Mrs. Burke, who purchased it directly from the Mt. Vernon-Woodberry Mills.

At this point, the title goes to a foreclosure, with the assignee being J. Cooper Crossan and the property belonging to the Oak Tire and Rubber Company, possibly a subsidiary of MT. Vernon Woodberry Mills. The entire town was auctioned off as a mill in 1916, and was owned for a time

by the Merrymans. Mount Vernon actually recieved title from Albert D. Jones and Albert A. Blakeney (a county commissioner) August 24, 1899, 241-43. This ownership went as far back as 1881 in a lease arrangement, with these gentlemen acquiring ownership in 1883-4.


