The T. Hanley House was constructed circa 1875 along Liberty Road in the Second District town of Harrisonville. The building appears to be the T. Hanley House depicted in the 1877 county atlas. The extant dwelling, however, does not appear to sit as far back from Liberty Road as the structure indicated on the map. An intensive-level survey combined with deed research would aid in determining a more exact construction date for the building. At that time, the village of Harrisonville was beginning to take shape along Liberty Road. According to the late 19th century atlas, Harrisonville included a blacksmith's shop, wheelwright's shop, fraternal hall, steam sawmill, and the Liberty Hotel. Between 1877 and 1915, the built environment changed considerably. Whereas the earlier atlas depicted only a few dwellings along Liberty Road, the early 20th century map reveals that more houses had been constructed in addition to the non-residential buildings that populated the landscape. The atlas also reveals that the late 19th century T. Hanley House was occupied in the early 20th century by J. Hanley and also served as a store. The two-part architecture of the building reveals its dual use. The three-bay-wide portion of the building with a side gable roof would have served as the dwelling, while the front-gabled section would have been used as a store.

Currently vacant, the vernacular building stands two-and-a-half stories tall and three bays wide with a two-story ell on the rear and a two-and-a-half story wing to the northwest. The random rubble stone foundation of the main block supports a wood frame structure that is clad in asbestos shingles. The roofline is pierced with both an interior-end and a central-interior chimney made of brick. The roof over the main block is an asphalt shingled side gable that ends in a hip over the wing of the building. A center gable peak projects from the façade of the main block. In this gable end is a pointed-arch 2/2 window. The rest of the façade is pierced with five, 1/1 windows. A single-leaf wood door that is paneled with lights marks the entry with a two-light transom. Protecting the first story is a half-hipped porch that is three-bays wide with chamfered posts and scroll-sawn brackets. The front gable of the projecting northwest wing creates an L-shape with the main block. A parged stone foundation supports a wood frame structure that is also clad with asbestos shingles. Three 2/2 windows pierce this façade as well as a round-arched 2/2 in the gable end. A half-hipped, one-bay porch with chamfered posts protects the multi-light door of the single-leaf entry. Four deteriorated outbuildings are grouped in an overgrown area to the north of the main dwelling.

Built circa 1875, this building fronts southwest on a grassy lot with overgrown foundation plantings. Currently vacant, the vernacular building stands two-and-a-half stories tall and three bays wide with a two-story ell on the rear and a two-and-a-half story wing to the northwest. The random rubble stone foundation of the main block supports a wood frame structure that is clad in asbestos shingles. The roofline is pierced with both an interior-end and a central-interior chimney made of brick. The roof over the main block is an asphalt shingled side gable that ends in a hip over the wing of the building. A center gable peak projects from the façade of the main block. In this gable end is a pointed-arch 2/2 window. The rest of the façade is pierced with five, 1/1 windows. A single-leaf wood door that is paneled with lights marks the entry with a two-light transom. Protecting the first story is a half-hipped porch that is three-bays wide with chamfered posts and scroll-sawn brackets. The front gable of the projecting northwest wing creates an L-shape with the main block. A parged stone foundation supports a wood frame structure that is also clad with asbestos shingles. Three 2/2 windows pierce this façade as well as a round-arched 2/2 in the gable end. A half-hipped, one-bay porch with chamfered posts protects the multi-light door of the single-leaf entry. The rear ell has a brick pier foundation, a wood frame structure with asbestos shingles, and a shed roof. Flanking the ell are two, shed roof one-story additions including a three-bay porch.

Four deteriorated outbuildings are grouped in an overgrown area to the north of the main dwelling. Built on a random rubble stone foundation, a circa 1900 wood frame garage is clad with wood shingles. It has a front gable roof with metal standing seam cladding, a roll-up wood door that is paneled with lights, and a central-interior brick chimney. Also, there is a single-leaf vertical board door in the gable end.

Located next to the garage is a circa 1900 wood frame pump house with log sills above a random rubble stone foundation. The building features wood German siding and a front gable roof with metal standing seam cladding. There are two single-leaf doors on the façade. The main entry is a paneled wood door. In the gable end a second door is clad with wood German siding.

A circa 1900 wood frame shed with log sills and board-and-batten siding is located behind the pump house. The shed features a front gable roof with asphalt shingles and a single-leaf board-and-batten door.

Next to this shed is a circa 1930 shed. This three-bay structure has three window openings, wood shingle siding, and shed roof with asphalt shingles.



DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This large frame house is 2 and one half stories high, three bays wide by one bay deep, and faces southwest. The principal facade is symmetrical, with a transomed entrance in the central bay flanked by 1/1 sash, three 1/1 sash above, and a pointed sash window in the central cross gable lighting the attic. A one-story porch with scrollwork brackets extends across the facade. A brick interior chimney rises from the peak of each gable.

This building diverges from the typical late 19th century Maryland center-gable house form in that a full-height ell adjoins the west gable and projects forward. The ell has a gable facade with a central entrance flanked by 2/2 windows and sheltered by a porch with unadorned posts, a single 2/2 window centered on the second story and a round-arched sash in the peak.



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
