DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

In form, this building resembles the Kinter-Tenement and the Cooling-Bouchelle house on Bohemia Avenue. It was probably built around 1890 - 1900 and possesses some of the small details of the period.

It is a two bay wide structure, two storys tall with screened porch across the facade. In the center of the 'A' roof rises a wide gable with 4/4 sash window and imbricated shingles, the lower course extending beneath the overhanging eave, like a fascia. The walls are covered with white weatherboard and the trim is painted dark green. There are two windows with 1/1 sash on the second story and two pair of windows flanking the off-center entrance on the first story. The porch has a hip roof which is supported on four turned posts with pierced brackets. Screening is fastened to the outside of the porch, the lower portion being solid plywood panels.

Behind the building is an 'L' wing with shed addition on its north side adjacent the back of the main portion.

An attractive picket gate seperates the front of the house from the side walk.

One of the alterations which would improve the appearance of the building, beside a paint job, would be the re-installation of the screening on the inside of the porch posts, thus showing the porch details.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Beiswanger House is important to the street for its scale, which is similar to its neighbors. Architecturally, the imbricated shingle gable and the porch are the best features to the otherwise plain structure.

This house has been in use as a dwelling since it was built, probably by Samuel F. Broadway. There is nothing especially significant about the property other than being a comfortable, small, town house.

Broadway leased the land from the Bayards in 1849 but the building now on the lot does not appear to have been built at that time.
