DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The second house east of Bohemia Avenue on Second Street is a one story bungalow which resembles the building on George Street formerly used as a soft drink bottling plant. It probably dates from the 20th century.

Its walls are covered with blue grey asbestos siding and the windows have 1/1 sash. The roof is covered with blue asphalt shingle. The gable of the building faces Second Street, which has a center door flanked by two windows. There is also a leanto on the west and south sides of the main block of the dwelling.

A concrete block chimney rises on the outside east wall of the main block.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architecturally, this small dwelling is of little interest to the historic district. However, it is the same scale building as its neighbors to the west and north. From a distance, the scale of these small buildings as well as their being located down hill from Bohemia Avenue places emphasis on the dwellings along Bohemia Avenue which are of architectural merit. It is recommended that the scale of the building in this area maintain a low profile so that the main street can appear of primary importance.

This house was originally part of property made up of the three houses on the south side of Second Street, one of which is now in use as a post office and apartment house; the other two are small dwellings.

Dr. Samuel Martindale, apparently an early physician, leased the land in 1846 from Richard H. Bayard. No doubt one of the early owners built the two small houses as homes for employees or tennant houses.

Furman Layman became owner in 1860, of the three lots together. In his will, he devised them to William J. Pryor, his grandson. Since then they have been owned separately and the small houses have generally been occupied by the owners.
