DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The small derelict building on Second Street is an interesting vernacular structure probably constructed during the fourth quarter of the 19th century. Its street facade is two bays wide, with door on the west bay. Its window, which formerly had louvered shutters retains 6/6 sash. The second story windows have 3/6 sash and no traces of shutters.

One of the interesting original features of the house was a pierced scalloped eave board, most of which has been removed.

The building was originally one story over the back room, but a seam above the first story level suggests that the roof was raised to accomodate a low sleeping space. It also possessed the same decorative eave board.

On the east side of the back room is a leanto half of which houses an old flush toilet.

Between the house and creek are two derelict sheds and some traces of fencing.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This tenement is architecturally important to the district because of its original detail which resembles two buildings on Third Street west of George. Its scale emphasizes the small hill from the water's edge to Bohemia Avenue and the height of the Bohemia Avenue houses.

This house is shown on the 1878 Lake's Atlas Map of Chesapeake City. The same building was probably there many years before that date. In a deed dated 2 October 1848, Richard H. Bayard transferred one hundred and twelve acres of land to the heirs of Kendall Cropper. (GMC 16/278) This transfer exempts an acre of ground bounded on the north by Back Creek, other three sides by this tract. It allows for a thirty foot roadway over Sipple's Gut into Second Street. At this time Second Street was becoming a busy thoroughfare leading from town east to a lime kiln, a saw mill, log storage ponds, the ice house and prosperous farms. The family living in this small house could see the goings and comings in town and also see the activity on the Canal and Back Creek.
