DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Taylor-Cole House c. 1850-1870 is a 2½ story I-House located at the end of a long lane off New Bridge Road. The primary facade has a southeastern exposure while the main gable runs on a northeast/southwestern axis.

The 2½ story frame house is 3 bays across by one room deep. It rests on an uncoursed stone foundation and is sheathed with composition tile over weatherboard. There is a medium pitch to the slate roof. Single interior stretcher bond brick stove stacks are found in each gable end. The caps are corbeled out two rows. A small shed roof kitchen extension is attached to the west side of the main block. A shed roof porch extends across the main facade and is supported by square supports. The ends of the porch roof are decorated with saw-tooth edges.

The main facade fenestration is symmetrical with the main entrance in the central bay. The door has a 19th century paneled front with a colored glass transom. The 6/6 window sash have plain surrounds. The soffits were left open.

The gable ends have two 6/6 sash windows on each floor and two 4 pane attic windows which flank the chimney stack. 6 pane basement windows are located at ground level.

The west side is partially covered with the single story kitchen addition, which occupies one bay. Similar details are found on the rest of this facade.

The interior has very plain Empire Mantels. 4 panel doors are found inside also.

The farm buildings consist of barn, and 2 storage and wagon sheds. They are sheathed with board and batten and novelty siding. Their roofs are tin.


