On this property is the site of William Stone's house which was destroyed by fire in the 18th century. It was later replaced by a larger, one-room frame house which has also been destroyed.

William Stone was a proprietary Governor of Maryland, 1649-1651, and an ancestor of Thomas Stone, a Maryland signer of the Declaration of Independence.
