



Port Tobacco



Julius Quenzel sold dry goods, millinery, jewelry, and watches and clocks from this location in the latter part of the nineteenth century. The building was of frame construction, one-story in height, with a centered door flanked by two windows on its north facade. A mid-twentieth century building now stands on the same site.


