DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two story frame house is now abandoned and in derelict condition, and does not reflect its attractive appearance during the days of its occupancy, according to Mrs. Katie Thomas, whose ancestors built and owned this house. The house faces the old county road, and the yard was boxed off in a picket fence, and bordered with flower gardens. Today that road is no longer used, and the new county road cuts behind the house. None of the farm buildings related to this site remain, but they once stood in the area of the present-day county road. Those outbuildings included an eight room tobacco barn, which also included a one room stable for the farm horse, and a room for storage of corn. There was no meat house, according to Charles Lancaster (the elderly neighbor who lived in this house after the Johnson-Brown descendants had moved out). The meat was stored instead in salt barrels in the kitchen, he said.

The facade of the house faces east, and the roof line runs north-south. The facade has three bays, a door centrally placed and two windows flanking it, with double hung sashes pinned by wooden dowels, and containing 6 x 6 lights. The block is one bay in depth, and from the center of the back length extended a one bay kitchen, which has since been pulled down. A brick chimney of common bond ascended the north gable end. The framing members are up and down saw cut, except for the sills which were hewn.

The frame was sheathed by weatherboards attached by cut nails.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to the present owner, Mrs. DKatie Thomas, this house was built by her ancestors, the Johnson family, who were free Negroes in antebellum Charles County. She said that the house was c. 150 years old. If records can be found to confirm this, this dwelling would be one of the few homes of free Negroes still standing in southern Maryland, and one of the finest.

CONTINUATION OF THE PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION OF THE
JOHNSON-BROWN HOUSE:

In plan, there were two rooms in the downstairs principal block and two upstairs. Along the western wall to the south of the entrance ascended a narrow staircase enclosed by planks, a surprisingly plain feature for this house. Since the house was locked, an investigation of the interior for decorative details was not possible.


