

JOHN C. COCKEY HOUSE

177 EAST MAIN STREET

The variety of Westminster's basic 3-bay structure does, at times, seem infinite. Number 177 East Main Street is located on the north side of that thoroughfare, a few feet east of its intersection with Center Street. It is one of a score of two-story, side-hall, double-parlor houses executed in brick, laid here in a crisp Flemish Bond. The house is, in fact, as perfect a "norm" as can be found - some are larger scale, some smaller; some have finer brick work, some coarser; some are better preserved, some worse. Probably built by members of the Mathias family, around 1800, it passed into James Cockey's hands in 1818. Cockey was one of the first school teachers in Westminster, and was also instrumental in organizing the Westminster Volunteer Fire Company. The house has recently been adapted, successfully, into attorneys' offices.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The variety of Westminster's basic three-bay structures does, at times, seem infinite (despite an occasional feeling of staleness). Number 177 East Main Street is located on the north side of that thoroughfare (Maryland Route 32), a few feet east of its intersection with Center Street. It is one of a score of two-story, side-hall, double-parlor houses, this time executed in brick laid, in Flemish Bond, on the principal facade, above a low-uncoursed fieldstone foundation. The entrance door is the eastern ground floor bay and is chastely, diminutively elegant in its small three part modillion entablature supported by fluted orderless pilasters. A four-light transom tops the door itself, which has eight-panels above two brick steps. The facade's other five bays are six-over-six, double-hung, sash windows (two on the ground floor, three on the second). The windows all have flanking black louvered shutters, white wooden sills, and flat gauged arches (three courses on the second floor, four on the first). The eaves of the unpainted, corrugated, sheet metal covered roof are of four-step corbelled brick with two staggered rows of perpendicular brick "dentils".

The west facade, which overlooks and is, in part, adjacent to a building acting as offices for a tombstone company, is laid in four course common bond with a flat brick chimney flush with the wall, rising at the gable's peak. Two small four-light windows flank the chimney and light the attic. There is only one window in this section of the building - it is to the rear, on the second story and has 6/6 panes. In good Westminster style, there is a small scale, four course common bond, two-story extension; this one has three-step brick corbelling at the eaves with two regularly placed 6/6 windows on the second floor. These windows are aligned with the Main section's window and are treated the same, i.e., with three course gauged flat arches, white wooden sills, and black louvered shutters.

Originally, there was probably a double tier porch along the eastern side of this rear wing. It has recently (c. 1955) been enclosed by white clapboard leaving one glass and aluminum storm door on its second floor. The door is approached, by a single flight of wooden steps, from the north. The north front of this former porch has a 4/4 simply-enframed window in the center of its second floor. The remaining north facade of the building is the four course common bond wall of the "wing". This gable end wall has two second-story 6/6 windows; the windows are archless and shutterless, but do possess white wooden sills. There is a wooden bulkhead cellar entrance in the center of this facade.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

There is a certain continuity of normalcy about 177 East Main Street. Architecturally, the building is a fine, quiet example of the 3-bay side-hall, Westminster house. It is, in fact, as perfect a "norm" as can be found - some are larger scale, some smaller, some have finer brick work, some coarser, some are better preserved, some worse. Probably built by members of the Mathias family, it somehow passed among that family's various members until James Cockey took title March 30, 1818 for \$2000 (Frederick County Deed Book JS 6, Page 655). Cockey, mentioned by Mrs. Katharine Shellman as a "school teacher", was also instrumental in organizing the Westminster Fire Company (according to the Fire Company's 150th anniversary pamphlet). After Cockey's death, his trustee, John Fisher, sold the house to Thomas Gurley (Carroll County Deed WW6/86 - July 13, 1841). Four changes in title now occur until the next major family takes title: Gurley sells to David Boyd (6/32, March 26, 1841); Boyd sells to John Malambra (12/303, March 10, 1851), Malambra sells to George Fourke (25/131, October 7, 1858), and Fourke sells to Rosanna Walsh (83/138, July 6, 1896). The house stayed in the possession of her family until her children sold on July 30, 1940 (173/282) to Alice N. Hiltabridle, who sold to Charles O. Fisher, the present owner (381/712), November 20, 1964). Fisher is a younger partner in the law firm headed by D. Eugene Walsh (son of Rosanna) who was born and reared in the house now (happily) adapted into his law offices. Circles, circles, circles.
