The mid-nineteenth century farmhouse at 320 College View Boulevard appears to have been built during the late 1860s-early 1870s and is an excellent example of stone construction in the county. The structure is constructed of fieldstone and is a broadly proportioned house of the regional farmhouse style. Its main facade faces southeast and has a full-length, double-tiered porch. The farm complex presents a good example of a late nineteenth century farmstead.
