Dorseytown (Survey) Historic District
Mt. Airy (vicinity)

Summary:

Dorseytown was apparently founded by Grafton "Nick" Dorsey, who settled in the area in the late nineteenth century. The 1877 map shows no buildings in this vicinity, but by 1917 there were apparently half a dozen. One of these was a shop owned by an "N. Dorsey," probably the founder. The other identified resident was an "A. Gassoway." Its development is of interest because it employs the beginnings of a grid plan, with a street (Ellis) that parallels the main road (Ridge Road), despite its very small size. Most villages in Carroll County did not develop on the grid plan until after settlement had stretched a great deal over the main road. It remains a small African-American community north of Mount Airy, but nothing more is known of its history at this time.

The Dorseytown (Survey) Historic District is located at the northern end of the town of Mt. Airy in southwestern Carroll County, Maryland. The district runs along Main Street (Ridge Road), which runs roughly north-south along the top of a ridge, and the land drops off steeply on both sides of the road. The district is also located along Ellis Road, which is a U-shaped road on the west side of Main Street and connects to Main Street at the northern and southern ends of Dorseytown. Ellis Road runs down the ridge and is very wooded and primarily unpaved. The buildings are all freestanding, tend to be set close to the road, but with a great deal of space between them.

On the west side of Main Street, at the corner of Ellis Road, is a bungalow with diamond-pattern, green asphalt shingles. It is a 1½-story, three-bay by three-bay structure, with a recent addition on the rear elevation. It has a center door with nine lights over a cross buck, and a 3/1 sash to either side. The porch has CMU's and four Doric columns. The house has a gable roof and a shed roof dormer that has three four-light sash.

1205 Main Street is a 2½-story building that is four bays on the first story and three bays on the second story. It is two bays deep. It is a Pennsylvania farmhouse-plan building with aluminum siding and new 1/1 sash. It has a gable roof with a north-south ridge, and a central gabled wall dormer with a pentagonal light. There is an ell on the rear, or east, elevation.

The building at 1187 Main Street is set on brick piers with concrete and CMU infill between the piers. It is a one-story, three-bay by two-bay structure with the gable end to the street. The gable roof has an east-west ridge and is covered in corrugated metal. The walls are covered with weatherboards that appear to be made of masonite. There is a shed-roof porch on the front, or west, elevation. This elevation has a new six-panel door in the center, with a 6/6 sash to the north, and large paired 6/6 sash to the south.

There are two separate structures associated with 1116 Main Street. The northern building is a one-story, three-bay by one-bay structure, with a one-bay addition on the rear, or west, elevation. The front, or east, elevation has aluminum siding, while the side elevations are covered with narrow weatherboards. The east elevation has a center door with four lights over two panels. This is flanked on either side by a large four-light sash with a six-light transom. The building has a CMU foundation and a shed roof that slopes to the west. The side elevations have 4/4 sash.

The southern building at 1116 Main Street is a two-story, three-bay by two-bay structure with a gable end to the street. It is now covered in asbestos-shingle siding, but beneath it is German siding on the front, or east, elevation, and narrow weatherboards on the side elevations that are identical to its neighbor. The gable roof has an east-west ridge and has corrugated metal. The first story has a center entrance with one light in the door and a 2/2 sash on either side. There is a shed-roof porch with two turned columns. The second story has a 2/2 sash in each of the end bays, and the gable end has a four-light sash. The north elevation has two 2/2 sash on the first and second stories. There is an addition on the south elevation and on the rear, or west, elevation.

202 and 1307 Ellis Road are both two-story, two-bay by one-bay buildings that have an enclosed porch on the first story and a gable roof with a north-south ridge. There are also later additions on the rear elevations of both of them. 202 has aluminum siding, new 1/1 sash, and a corrugated-metal roof with a steeper pitch than that found on 1307. The latter has aluminum siding and asphalt shingles on the roof. Both structures have interior brick chimneys.

The house at the north bend of Ellis Road is a two-story, two-bay by one-bay structure very similar to the previous two, but it has an enclosed porch on the west and north sides of the first story. There is aluminum siding and a gable roof of corrugated metal, with a north-south ridge. It has an interior brick chimney.

1313 Ellis Road has a two-bay by one-bay, two-story section on the east end, and a two-bay by one-bay, one-story section on the west end. All of it is covered with brick-pattern asphalt shingles over weatherboards. Both sections have asphalt shingle gable roofs with east-west ridges. The east section has 6/6 sash, and the west section has 2/2 sash. The east section had a porch on the north elevation. The west section has a rubble stone foundation on the north and south sides, with brick infill on the west end.


