Sited on the northwest corner of Locust and Carpenter streets, the Marshall house belongs to a handful of single-story, double-pile frame houses erected during the first decade of the nineteenth century. In contrast to the other houses of the same form, the Marshall house contains one of the better surviving interiors with its Federal period mantels, stair, doors, and chair rail. The second floor is divided by beaded board partitions.

As photographed around 1938-1940, the Marshall house was covered with horizontal weatherboards and the south gable end had an exposed brick firewall. A short single-story addition was attached to the north end.

Construction of this house is attributed to John Harrison, who purchased this property in 1803 from Joseph Harrison for \$39.(30/346). At John Harrison's death the Circuit Court of Talbot County appointed a trustee and authorized the sale of the house and lot to Mary Ann Ash (59/254). The following year the house was transferred to Hugh Marshall for \$374.50 (60/76).

Marshall house description

The Marshall house stands on the northwest corner of the intersection of Locust and Carpenter streets in St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The single-story frame house faces east with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built c. 1800-1810, double-pile frame house rests on a minimal brick foundation, and it is sheathed with aluminum siding. A steeply pitched roof with flush gable ends and a boxed cornice is covered with asphalt shingles.

The east (main) elevation is three bays across with a center door and flanking windows with replaced sash. A concrete front step, a metal awning, and louvered aluminum shutters have been added to the front facade.

The south side is marked by gable end windows located to each side of the stuccoed interior end brick chimney. The north end is likewise marked by gable end windows with replaced sash.

The west (rear) facade has a center door and flanking windows like the front wall.

The two-room first floor interior has been generally remodeled with the front room converted to a kitchen. In spite of artificial layers of imitation brick and board paneling, the Federal period mantels, doors, and chair rail remain in place. The front corner mantel follows a standard Federal period format with a molded surround, a five-part frieze and a broken shelf. The frieze blocks are fluted and the mantel shelf consists of a complex series of early nineteenth-century moldings. The back room survives with its mantel in addition to the enclosed winder stair. The mantel has a molded surround and a two-part paneled frieze. This mantel shelf is not broken, and it consists of a series of cyma curves and molded edges. The chair rail also remains in place in the back room. The stair rises against the south wall behind a raised four-panel door.

The second floor is divided into three rooms by beaded board partitions. Board and batten doors are framed by narrow ovolo molded surrounds. The rooms are finished with beaded baseboard, and the small crawl space access doors are framed by the same molded surround.

The attic was inaccessible, so the exact nail type was not determined.

The Marshall house is one of a handful of single-story or story-and-a-half double pile frame or brick houses that stand in the residential districts of St. Michaels. In contrast to the other houses of the same form, the Marshall house contains one of the better surviving interiors with its Federal period mantels, doors, and chair rail. The back stair is also another rare feature, as is the second floor with its beaded board partitions.

There are two suits. One is Marshall vs Hope and the other, Hope vs Marshall. Apparently the land was sold before the case(s) were wrapped up. I would prefer to omit the Chancery reference, except for the testimony regarding the condition of the house.

THIS DEED, Made this 16th, day of January, in the year of our Lord, one thousand, nine hundred and twenty-eight, by Elizabeth A. Willis (widow) of Talbot County, in the State of Maryland.

WITNESSETH, That in consideration of the sum of Three Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$350) the said Elizabeth A. Willis doth grant and convey unto Clarence H. Waters, of said County, and state, his heirs and assigns, in fee simple, all and singular that lot of land, situate, lying and being at the northwest corner, or intersection of Carpenters Alley and Locust Street, in the town of St. Michaels, in Talbot County aforesaid, and described as follows, that is to say:

BEGINNING for the same at a point on the north side of said Carpenters Alley, at the corner of the lot of the late John Jefferson, and running thence with said lot (known as Lot No. 3 on a plat made by Thomas J. Warren, Surveyor, April 7, 1874) north 18 degrees west twenty five (25) feet to the reserved land of the grantor; thence therewith north 71 degrees east, sixty (60) feet to Locust street, thence therewith, south 18 de-

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said lot or parcel of land and premises, above described and mentioned and hereby intended to be conveyed; together with the rights, privileges, appurtenances and advantages, thereto belonging, or appertaining unto and to the proper use and benefit of the said Clarence H. Waters, his heirs and assigns, in fee simple.

AND the said Elizabeth A. Willis, hereby covenants that she will warrant specially the property hereby granted and conveyed; and that she will execute such other and further assurances of said land and title as may be required.






