Although the core structure of the Young house dates to the mid nineteenth century, the building was heavily reworked during the 1940s and appears more like a twentieth-century bungalow. A full shed dormer was added across the the front along with a screened-in porch. Attached to the back of the frame structure was a dining room and kitchen wing. Despite the alterations, the house contributes to the historic nature of Water Street.

From the chain-of-title is appears James M. Seth erected this modest frame house as a rental property after his purchase of Lots 48, 49, and 50 in 1849. The Water Street lot was not sold again until 1915 when the property entered the Circuit Court of Talbot County for estate settlement. A structure appears at this location on the 1877 St. Michaels town map. The significant alterations on the house were accomplished after 1941 when Noble P. and Henrietta Estelle Seymour acquired the property.

The Young house stands at 402 Water Street in the center of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The story-and-a-half frame house faces east with the main gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Built during the third quarter of the nineteenth century, the wood shingled frame structure rests on a raised common bond brick foundation, and it is sheathed with an asphalt shingle roof. During the 1940s the original house was extensively reworked with a full shed dormer across the front and a long shed roofed service wing extends to the rear.

The east (main) facade is fully covered by a shed roofed screened in porch. Within the porch a center, partially glazed front door is flanked by paired six-over-two sash windows. The front door surround carries a beaded edge. Above the porch, the shed dormer is pierced by a series of seven six-over-six sash windows. Exposed above the windows is a row decorated rafter ends.

The gable ends are relatively plain with six-over-two sash windows lighting the first and second floors on the north end. Two-pane windows pierce the brick foundation wall. Lighting the second floor on the south wall is a single-pane sash window. The eaves to both ends are slightly extended.

The west (rear) wall of the main house is largely covered by a dining room and kitchen wing that extends farther westward with a single-story addition.

The interiors have been generally reworked with the removal of most nineteenth-century finishes. Upstairs a mid nineteenth-century partition with a four-panel door divides the second floor into two rooms. A two-panel door is found on the first floor left of the brick hearth.

A full shed dormer was added across the front along with a screened-in porch, and to the rear a dining room and kitchen was attached. Nevertheless, the house contributes to the architectural character of Water Street as a reworked nineteenth-century house in bungalow style taste.

From the chain-of-title it appears James M. Seth erected this modest frame house as a rental property after his purchase of Lots 48, 49, and 50 in 1849.(62/249) The Water Street lot was not sold again until 1915 when the property entered the Circuit Court of Talbot County for settlement. A structure appears at this location on the 1877 St. Michaels town map. The significant alterations on the house were accomplished after 1941 when Noble P. and Henrietta Estelle Seymour acquired the property.(251/266)


