It is clear from the research on this St. Mary's Square lot that William Tarr financed the construction of this two-story frame house sometime after he purchased "Lot 34" in 1841 from Matthew Spencer for \$88. The exterior architectural features of the building suggest the house was assembled during the 1850s or 1860s. In 1867, the Circuit Court of Talbot County authorized the sale of Tarr's house to reconcile his debts, but in the same year the property, described as "One house and lot on St. Mary's Square...being lot 34 on Town Plot," was transferred to Lewis Tarr for \$400. The property remained in Tarr family hands until the 1930s. Around World War II the house was purchased by William B. and William G. Harper, and Harper family members held title to the property until 1974.

The William Tarr house is one of the best preserved of the mid nineteenth-century dwellings on St. Mary's Square. Now used as a dress museum, the two-story, three-bay frame exterior has not been significantly altered. Plain weatherboard siding and a decorative turned post porch as well as six-over-six sash windows with louvered shutters contribute to the well-preserved nature of the house. The small frame outbuilding that stands in the back yard is one of the few nineteenth-century detached kitchens to survive in St. Michaels.

The William Tarr house, more recently known as the Harper house, stands at 400 St. Mary's Square in the center of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay frame house faces east with the main gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1860, the two-story, center hall frame dwelling is supported by a low brick pier foundation and is sheathed with weatherboard siding. The medium pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the south gable end is a two-story, two-bay wing of the same construction. Standing behind the house is a small single-story, frame outbuilding that formerly served as a detached kitchen.

The east (main) facade is a symmetrical three-bay elevation with a center four-panel door entrance and flanking six-over-six sash windows. The windows are hung with louvered shutters and the door is topped by a three-light transom. Stretching across the entire first floor is a turned post porch that retains decorative corner brackets and a standing seam tin roof. The second floor is lighted by three evenly spaced six-over-six sash windows hung with louvered shutters as well. The cornice above is boxed and trimmed with bed and crown moldings.

The north gable end is marked by a new brick chimney and flush ends. The south side, on the other hand, is fully covered by the two-story, two-bay wing that is detailed in the same way as the main block. Six-over-six sash windows light each floor and an interior brick stack protrudes through the roof.

The back of the main block is covered on the first floor by a single-story shed roofed kitchen that rests on a concrete block foundation. Three six-over-six sash windows light the second floor.

The interior was not seen.

The former detached kitchen has been relocated and currently stands in the far northwest corner of the lot on concrete block piers. The squarish weatherboard frame structure is covered by a gable roof with a layer of asphalt shingles. A board door marks the east side, while a four-panel door and a four-over-four sash window defines the south side. Inside the exposed framing members retain a fading coat of whitewash. Evident in the north gable end is the covered over opening for the former brick chimney.




