Construction of this prominent Italianate-influenced frame house is placed around 1878 during the occupancy of Edward S. and Jane Harrison, who resided at this address for approximately seven to eight years. Jane S. Harrison is listed as the sole grantee for the purchase of this lot in 1877 from Samuel and Mary A. Stewart. The Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas, published the same year, indicates that the lot was unimproved at the time. In 1880 Edward S. Harrison, a 54-year old "sailor" is listed in the U. S. Census with Jane, aged 55. Their 20-year old daughter Susan lived with them along with a host of boarders and a 13-year old black servant named Mahala Slaughter. One boarder, Clara Bouldin, was a schoolteacher with two young children. One other occupant, Sophia Harris, was listed in the census as a 65-year old boarder. Clearly, Jane Harrison augmented her husband's seafaring income by renting out space in this spacious frame dwelling. In 1885, Jane Harrison sold the house and lot to Eva Burgess for \$2,500, a transfer price that reflects the value of this substantial dwelling during the late 19th century.

Following a default on a mortgage to Jane Harrison, the property was sold to Franklin and Mary C. Baker in February 1889, and the Bakers turned around and sold it three months later to William Henry Haddaway for \$2,000. Henry Haddaway, as he is listed in the 1880 census, was a seafood packer. He resided here with his wife Sadie and four children. In 1893 the house and corner lot passed to the two daughters, Ella and Alice. The property remained in Haddaway family ownership until 1976.

Built with a low pitched hip roof and a wide eave accented with decorative brackets, the

design of the Harrison-Haddaway house was influenced by the Italianate style popular during the mid 19th century. The wide boards at each corner help define the blockish house, which is extended by a decorated front porch and bay windows. Unusual to the interior is the curved lateral wall that divides the northern third of the main block into two rooms instead of one long hallway. The addition of the curved wall provides a graceful transition from the staircase to the doorway that opens into the dining room. In addition, the divided hall provided for an additional room in back, probably used as a first floor chamber or perhaps a private study. The woodwork in the house follows common patterns of finish for the time with a boldly turned newel mahogany newel post and molded handrail supported by a series of turned balusters. The stringer is characteristically embellished with a scroll decoration also common to the third quarter of the 19th century. On the south side of the hall, generously sized parlors are separated by a large door opening fitted with pocket doors. The front room served as a formal parlor, whereas the rear room was probably used for dining due to its proximity to the rear service wing.

The Harrison-Haddaway house is located at 200 North Morris Street in the center of Oxford, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, two-bay side hall/double-pile frame house faces west with a hip roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Built around 1878, the two-story, two-bay frame structure is supported on a low brick foundation and the exterior is clad with a combination of German siding and vinyl siding. The low hip roof is covered with seamed tin. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story, two-bay rear wing, which is extended on two sides.

The west (main) elevation is a two-bay elevation with a side entrance occupying the north bay. A set of double-leaf doors, defined by heavily molded arched and rectangular panels, is bordered by two-light sidelights and a three-light transom. The adjacent bay is filled with a paired set of two-over-two sash windows flanked by louvered shutters. Stretching across the entire first story is chamfered post porch embellished with a variety of Victorian decoration. Boldly shaped brackets embellish the eave at each interval defined by a porch post. Pierced sawn brackets fill the inside corners and the center of each bay is marked by decorative sawnwork element that follows the shape of a fleur-de-lis. The roof is covered with seamed tin. Piercing the second floor are two sets of paired two-over-two sash windows flanked by louvered shutters. The outside edges of the house are fitted with wide corner boards that rise to a bracketed eave. The bracketed eave stretches around the front (west), north, and south sides. Rising through the middle of the house are two brick stove chimneys.

The south side is two bays deep with a single-story bay window marking the east bay and a single two-over-two sash filling the west bay. Like the main house the bay window is accented with eave brackets. The center bay window is filled with a two-over-two sash window, whereas the openings on each side are marked by single-pane sash windows. The second floor is lighted by a pair of two-over-two sash windows, and each opening is flanked by louvered shutters. Trimming the roof is a series of evenly spaced brackets. The north wall is similarly finished.

Covering the east (rear) wall is a two-story, two-bay rear wing that has been extensively reworked to incorporate a large kitchen and living room as well as an attached porch and garage. Extending from the south side of the kitchen is a single-story gable roofed outbuilding served by a tall single flue brick chimney.

The interior of the main block is divided into a four-room plan with an entrance and stairhall located in the northwest corner. The stair features a boldly turned mahogany newel post, a molded handrail, turned balusters, and a scroll decorated stringer. Original hardware survives on the inside face of the double front doors. Most distinctive to the front hall is the curved wall that provides a graceful transition between the staircase and the interior hall partition, thereby creating a fourth room on the first floor. Four-panel doors with ogee inset moldings are framed by beaded edge surrounds.

## 7.1 DESCRIPTION

Ogee molded baseboards trim the perimeter of the rooms. Surviving in the front parlor is a slate mantel painted white. Large pocket doors separate the two rooms. The rear parlor chimney stack has been stripped down to its rough masonry surface. A rear winder service stair is located in small rear hallway that leads to the current kitchen.

The second floor of the main house is divided into four rooms with shallow profile four-panel doors framed by beaded edge surrounds.

The Harrison-Haddaway house is an important structure that stands on the northeast corner of the intersection of North Morris and Wilson streets. The main block, reflecting the influence of the Italianate style, has survived in a well preserved state with much of its original woodwork intact. Its lively mid 19th century decorative elements contrast distinctly with the plainer facades of adjacent dwellings.
