C. 1795

The John Buckey Tavern, built by 1795, is a two and one-half story ell shaped coursed random grey stone residence set on a hill overlooking most of Buckeystown.

Its builder, John Buckey, is for whom the town was named. In 1800, John Buckey died, leaving the property to his wife, Elizabeth, who in 1807 sold it to her son George. George continued to operate the tavern for several years, but also established a Tannery immediately across the road which operated until the late nineteenth century.

In 1811, George Buckey offered the house for rent describing it as "a large and commodius house with a kitchen and smokehouse attached to it with a blacksmith and wheelwright shop." The house remained in the Buckey family when George died, as he left it to his son-in-law, Lewis Kemp.

In 1853, Kemp sold it to B. Amos Cunningham and it has had several owners since that time. However, like much of Buckeystown, it has undergone little change.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The John Buckey House, built by 1795, is a two and a half story ell shaped gable roofed coursed random stone residence set on a hill facing east from the west side of Route 85 in the northern half of Buckeystown.

The main facade of the building is four bays wide. The main entrance, a replaced paneled door with two light transom, is located in the second bay from the southeast corner. Originally the door was located in the third bay.

Occupying the remaining bays are double hung 6/6 windows with glazed windows and pegged frames. A nineteenth century columned porch with dentiled frieze extends along the entire front of the building on the first level. There are no windows on the north wall of the building. A three bay wide two story stone addition extends to the rear of the building. A frame addition made in the twentieth century extends from the rear of this addition.

The replaced asphalt gable roof is connected to the building by a boxed cornice. Large brick chimneys are located at the north and south ends of the main block of the building. A small single brick chimney extends from the southwest corner of the stone addition.

BUILDER/ARCHITECT John Buckey

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The John Buckey Tavern is one of the oldest structures standing in Buckeystown, and its builder is for whom the town was named.

In 1788, John Buckey purchased the land upon which the residence stands for pounds 100.¹ John established a residence and tavern in the present location of the building by 1795 according to local residents.

Since, Carrolltons Manor was located just west of the Buckeystown Pike and Ignatius Davis's Mill was operating at full scale east of the area, a tavern prospered.

In 1800 John Buckey died, leaving the property to his wife Elizabeth who in 1807 sold it to her son George.² George continued to operate the tavern for several years but also established a Tannery immediately across the road which operated until the late 19th century.

In 1811, George Buckey offered the house for rent describing it as "a large and commodius house with a kitchen and smokehouse attached to it with a blacksmith and wheelwright shop."³

The house remained in the Buckey family when George died as he left it to his son-in-law Lewis Kemp.

In 1853, Kemp sold it to B. Amos Cunningham and it has had several owners since that time. However, like much of Buckeystown it has undergone little change.

Buckeystown Historic District

Several small frame residences located on Buckingham Lane were built as workers' houses for the brickyards. Ruins of the cannery, another significant industry, can still be seen west on Manor Woods Road.

A fine brick Queen Anne building (now a carry-out) housed the offices of the Baker Brothers, the major entrepreneurs of the town who founded the Citizens National Bank in Frederick and also ran numerous farms, a cannery, and the Buckingham School, south of town. Across the street, is located a brick building which was the general store and post office and is now an antique shop and post office.

Two gas stations in the center of town and one equipment storage area are the only nonconforming areas in the boundaries of the historic district.
