DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Thomas Brickyards consists of eleven beehive brick baking kilns, a brick warehouse and service building.

Each kiln is approximately twelve feet in circumference constructed in a circular brick pattern with cast iron bands encircling the kilns. An arched entranceway goes through the center. Feeder arches where coal was shoveled to fire the kilns are located on the side close the ground.

Air vents are located in the floor of the kilns and an opening is situated in the center of the beehive kiln.

The kilns have been neglected and are in a deteriorating condition.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The location of the Thomas Brickyards has historically been an area of industrial activity for Buckeystown.

George Buckey established a tannery on the site in 1785 and according to an advertisement for the property in the "Citizen" newspaper of 1832 contained "42 vats with buildings and appurtenances." The tannery business was sold to the Baker Family and was operated by Daniel Baker until the later part of the nineteenth century.

In 1902, Charles F. Thomas established the C. F. Thomas and Son Brick Company, "Manufacturers of all kinds of red brick for building, paving, and ornamental work." It was the hope of Thomas to give the business to William Thomas, his son, but because of health problems, the business was sold instead to Asher Fire-Roofing Company which manufactured hollow building tile and brick. Subsequently several companies attempted to use the yards for brick manufacturing until 1974.

The brick kilns are in good condition considering their abandonment and are significant as reminders of industrial activity in Buckeystown and brick manufacturing in Frederick County.


