The St. Mark's Primary School was located southwest of the house but is no longer standing today.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

The Dayid Delauder House is a two and one-half story cross gable brick residence laid in common bond which faces south from the north side of Route 180 near Petersville.

The principal facade is five bays wide. The main entrance in a recessed paneled doorway is an original five panel door with center horizontal panel narrow wood lintel and doorsill, seven light transom with three side lights and underpaneling located in the third bay.

Occupying the remaining bays on the first and second level are original double hung 6/6 windows with wood lintels. The windows on the first level are slightly longer than those on the second level.

A false front gable with fishscale and diamond shaped wood shingling extends from the front of the flank gable roof. A four pane window embellished with jigsaw wood decoration and dentiled pediment is located in the center of the front gable.

A one story front porch with chamfered boxed columns, simple brackets and replaced cement floor extends across the entire front of the residence. It is covered by a replaced standing seam shed roof.

A two story frame addition extends three bays wide to the rear of the main block. The main block is two bays wide with double hung 6/6 windows occupying each bay on the south side. Two small four pane windows are located at the top of the north and south gable ends.

A two story open porch once extended across the north side of the building, however the first level of the rear addition has been enclosed and replaced 1/1 windows are located in each bay.

The original open porch with square columns and plain horizontal railing is located on the second level. A vertical board door is located in the second bay on this level and an original double hung 6/6 window occupies the first bay.

The most prominent feature of the rear addition is a massive shoulder exterior chimney constructed of random stone and brick on the west gable end.

A rear entrance is located in the second bay on the south side and is flanked by replaced 1/1 windows. This side of the building has been substantially changed by the addition of a one story screened porch.

The entire building is covered by a standing seam tin roof with a stepped brick cornice in the front of the building and boxed cornice in the rear with a plain frieze. The entire building is constructed on a coursed low random stone foundation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The David Delauder house is significant architecturally to the town of Petersville. Of particular significance is the massive stone and brick chimney on the kitchen addition part of the building and the very decorative Victorian front gable with fishscale and diamond shingling and unusual bracketed window with dentiled cornice.

The building was constructed in 1857 after David Delauder purchased several parcels of land to acquire six acres.<sup>1</sup> One parcel was purchased from George Richards who "excepted a privilege of use of the spring of water for the benefit of St. Mark's Primary School."<sup>2</sup>

The primary school was located southwest of the house but is no longer standing today. The house changed hands numerous times, but was primarily owned by the Delauder family until 1936.
