DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Samuel Clem Hse. is a small two story stone and cinder block building banked against a hill which faces west from the east side of Old Frederick Road in Utica. The house has been added to several times during its life which changed its original appearance.

The main block of the building is a small square banked two story stuccoed stone residence which has vernacular German styling. The original principal facade of the building faced south which faced an old road located just south of the existing building. The present main entrance faces the modern Old Frederick Road on the west side of the building.

The main block of the building is rectangular and two bays wide on each side except for the principal facade. The old principal facade is three bays wide and two stories high. A replaced frame open porch with tin shed roof, square wood supports and plain horizontal railing extends along the second level of the building continuing around the east side of the building. Located beneath this porch on the first level, an enclosed area constructed of whitewashed stucco over stone extends forward of the main block of the house. The enclosed area which shelters a spring is two bays wide with six pane sash with wood lintels. A vertical plank door enters the area from the east side. A double hung six over six window is located in each bay on the second level of the building.

The east gable side of the house is dominated by a massive stuccoed stone exterior chimney with replaced brick cap. One double hung six over six window with replaced louvered shutters is located in the northeast corner of the building.

The rear (north side) of the building has been substantially changed by the addition of a one story cinder block kitchen addition with corrugated tin shed roof. Two six over six windows are located along the north side of the addition. Part of the addition appears to have incorporated a stone wall of an outbuilding. The addition extends east of the main block of the building. One double hung six over six window with ranch style shutters is located on the east side of the addition.

Two double hung six over six windows with ranch style shutters are situated in the main gable of the east side of the house. The modern entrance to the house, a replaced paneled and multipaned door, is located directly below the gable window on the north side.

The house is covered by a standing seam flank gabled roof with exposed rafters. A second chimney rises from the north center of the house.

A small roofed German siding outbuilding stands in the southeast corner of the property.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Although not yet documented, it is believed that as early as 1769 a log building was constructed and used as a church and schoolhouse in the immediate vicinity of Utica.

The area was settled early by German immigrants. Although an exact construction date of the Samuel Clem House cannot be determined, the crude vernacular German styling would suggest a late eighteenth or early nineteenth century date.

The house was owned by William Todd, entrepreneur of the Utica Mills located on nearby Fishing Creek by the second quarter of the nineteenth century.¹ Todd made his residence at the "mansion house" located across the street and willed that the proceeds of the "house and lot of about two acres on the east side of the main road benefit his daughter, Rebecca."²

William Todd, the son, acquired the property from the trustees of his father's estate selling it to Rebecca Wachter in 1863 for \$600.00. Subsequently, the house was sold to Samuel Clem, who lived there as indicated on the 1873 Titus Atlas until his death in 1895.

George W. Leather bought the house for \$501.50 from Clem's heir and lived there with his wife, Mary, who later acquired the property from his estate.³ At her death in 1948, the house was sold and has had three subsequent owners.

The simple stonehouse is particularly significant as an early vernacular German dwelling which has survived.


