DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

William's Project is located on the south side of Devilbiss Bridge Road at its intersection with Lenhart Road in Frederick County, Maryland. Facing north toward the road, this 2½-story eighteenth century house was built of red and grey sandstone rubble with large, somewhat irregular quoins. The three-bay central block has interior chimneys, and there is a 1½-story kitchen wing built to the east. The kitchen wing is divided into two rooms and forms an ell. The rear room is of frame construction, and its floor level is slightly lower than the stone (front) part. Both rooms have large cooking fireplaces. The one to the front is adjacent to the main house, and its flue is part of the chimney of the main block. A box stair in this front room leads to a small loft thought to have been used to keep slaves. The rear frame kitchen was probably a later addition. It retains its large stone fireplace at the rear of the ell, though the remainder of the room is now a modern kitchen. A small frame addition has been built to the east of the ell, thus increasing the size of the new kitchen. Each gable end of the main house is solid stone except for a small window, one to light the stair on the east and a larger one to light the bedroom in the southwest corner of the second floor. The entire building is covered by a tin roof painted mauve.

William's Project retains many original features. A large number of the 6/6 windows in the main block and stone wing are old. The front door and its strap hinges are original as well as many interior features including the chair rail existing throughout most of the house, the box stair, the sills, floors and many interior doors and hinges. Fireplaces in the main house have arched openings but no mantels. On the second floor, the two western bedrooms have corner fireplaces. The attic was evidently used as a smokehouse at one time since there are small vents in the eastern chimney and grease stains on the floor. The rafters are pinned and numbered with Roman numerals. In the basement, some of the pegs in the chamfered beams are still in place.

The present owner has done much to restore and maintain William's Project. The solid blinds and window mullions were reproduced from the original. Partitions dividing the first-floor main room of the house into three smaller rooms were not original and were removed. To the rear of the house a two-story porch enclosed by jalousies has been added. No outbuildings remain, but there is a storage cave with an arched stone opening east of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

William's Project is located at the intersection of Devilbiss Bridge Road and Lenhart Road in Frederick County, Maryland. The stone house is thought to have been built between 1739 and 1763 by Reverend William Williams. Reverend Williams, a wealthy Presbyterian minister, came to America from Wales before 1717. He settled in Delaware and then moved to what is now Summits Point, West Virginia, where he received special permission to preach. Sometime between 1739 and 1759 he changed his legal residence to Frederick County, Maryland. He owned two tracts, William's Project which was surveyed in 1739 and Green Bottom in present day Washington County, Maryland.

William's Project, a tract of 250 acres, was purchased by Alexander Ogle in 1763. Ogle came to Frederick County from Wilmington, Delaware. He became a large landowner in Maryland and Virginia and operated a mill near his house. During the Revolution, Alexander Ogle made a substantial contribution by supplying large amounts of flour to the state from his mill on Monocacy Creek.

William's Project is one of the oldest houses in Frederick County. It retains much of its original appearance and most of the interior has been preserved. This stone house has been carefully restored by the present owner and is a fine example of eighteenth century domestic architecture in Frederick County.


