Ellerton is a rural village developed from about 1865 to 1900 which is centered on the Maryland Route 17 crossing of Middle Creek at the junction of Wolfsville, Harmony, and Harp Hill Roads. It contains five residences, most of which are located on Wolfsville Road on the north side of Middle Creek, a general store, a creamery, a former blacksmith shop, and a circa 1900 portable iron steam engine used in agricultural and industrial work. The residences are mostly log with modern artificial siding and one-story porches. One of the houses is brick. All were built about 1870-1878 and one was once a combined store and residence, the Summers Store at 10651 Wolfsville Road. The other store was the Thomas F. Bittle Store, built about 1867-68, which is a well-preserved representative of the rural general store of the late 19th century. The creamery was built about 1890 and also retains much of its original exterior character. Both the Bittle Store and the creamery are now storage buildings. Three of the dwellings also have contributing domestic outbuildings. The village of Ellerton had a post office in the Bittle Store, a school, and at least one other shop, a shoemaker's. A stone foundation on the south side of Wolfsville Road is the probable location of the shoemaking shop and the school stood on the north side near the east end of the survey district. The district exemplifies the development of rural communities in response to physical features and transportation networks in the late 19th century, as well as the simple vernacular architectural style of the period.

on the principal east elevation. Probably in the 1890's, the east elevation of the store was extended with a flat-roofed section, to which an attic space was later added, restoring a gable roof profile at an irregular angle. The evidence of these changes is visible on the south elevation of the building, where the original stone foundation, the differences in roofline and siding are clearly seen. The east elevation of the enlarged store had four bays, with a fifth bay added in the early 20th century on the north elevation. The exterior is covered with german siding. The entrance is in the center bay with a dutch door with raised panels under a three-light transom. The first story windows are covered with raised panel shutters; the second story windows have 6/6 sash. The roof is standing seam metal. The west elevation of the original store is obscured by another addition of the early 20th century. This one-story shed section has a stone foundation, which is discernible from the original foundation by the difference in stone and pointing technique on the south elevation. The addition has board and batten siding. The store was operated by Thomas F. Bittle until 1917 and by his son J. Thomas Bittle from 1917 until its closing in about 1950. Since that time, it has been used primarily as a storage building.

Frick Steam Engine: Immediately in front of the Bittle Store's east elevation is a circa 1900 portable steam engine, identified on its boiler as the Frick "Eclipse" model. The engine is basically a long cylindrical tank with a drive wheel mechanism on the top and a smoke stack near one end of the tank. A photo in The History of Wolfsville shows that the stack was once much taller than at present, reaching above the roofline of the store. No other information about the engine has been researched; however, similar engines are described in the Wolfsville history as being taken from farm to farm to run farm equipment and saw mills. This engine is now owned by Harold Leatherman, son of the owner of the parcel on which the store is located.

Creamery, west side of Harp Hill Road, south of Bittle Store: The two-story frame creamery was built about 1890 and was operated by Elmer and Simon Raymer. The building was apparently owned by Bittle. It has german siding and shed additions of the early 1920's on the west and east elevations. The gable and shed roofs are standing seam metal. A vertical tongue-and-groove door is located in the north elevation and sliding doors are located in the east side addition, probably for drive-in deliveries. The windows are 6/6 and are in the east elevation and the second level of the central section.

Barn: A small frame bank barn probably associated with the creamery is located just south of the creamery building. It has vertical siding and a stone foundation. Two sliding doors are located on the east elevation above the narrow forebay. The gable roof is covered with corrugated metal. The barn was probably built in the 1890's.

10708 Harp Hill Road: The two-story brick dwelling was built about 1870 and has four bays on the east elevation with double entrances in the inner bays. A one-story porch with brackets and chamfered posts extends across the facade. The wood lintels and sills of the window openings are plain and the sash is 2/2. The slate roof has interior end chimneys. A rear shed addition is

attached to the west elevation. A non-contributing concrete block garage is also located on the property.

Poffenberger blacksmith shop: The one-story log blacksmith shop is located on the northeast corner of Harp Hill and Wolfsville Roads just north of the bridge. Its exterior appearance is greatly altered, with metal siding and an extended standing seam metal roof with an overhang on the south elevation above modern double lift type doors. The windows in the side elevations are 3/3. The interior was not accessible for this survey; however, Mrs. Arthur Leatherman, one of the property owners, said the original log structure is enclosed within the exterior walls and roof and that it is now used for equipment storage. The original stone foundation has been replaced with concrete block. The shop was probably built about 1873 when Hezekiah Poffenberger purchased 60 square perches from Elias Routzahn, from whose farm the lots along the north side of Wolfsville Road were subdivided.

Poffenberger House, 10716 Wolfsville Road: Built about 1873, the two-story log dwelling has a three-bay main elevation facing south. Its exterior is currently covered with composition brick siding. A one-story porch and two entrances are located on the south elevation. The sash is 1/1 replacement, flanked by modern metal shutters. A two-story rear wing extends to the north and has an enclosed two-story porch on the east elevation. The pressed metal gable roof has an exterior chimney on the west elevation of the main section. At the rear of the wing is a log wash house with modern siding and an extended gable roof of corrugated metal. The hood on the south end shelters the entrance door of vertical boards. An exterior brick chimney is located at the north gable end. A frame smokehouse stands immediately west of the wash house. It has vinyl siding and a standing seam metal roof with a vertical board door in the south elevation. Both outbuildings date from the same period as the dwelling. A non-contributing concrete block garage is located east of the wash house.

Dr. Wachter House, 10726 Wolfsville Road: The two-story log house was built about 1870 and, from about 1881 to 1903, was occupied by Dr. Charles L. Wachter, a physician. It has four bays with double entrances and a one-story porch with brackets and turned columns. The exterior is covered with composition siding and the roof is also composition. The chimneys are located at each interior end. The windows are 2/2 with segmental arched frames. A one-story shed addition is located on the north elevation. A frame or log summer kitchen is located northwest of the house. It is one story in height, with german siding, 2/2 windows, and a standing seam metal roof. The exterior chimney is located at the west end and is stone and brick. Just northwest of the summer kitchen is a frame shed, the use of which is undetermined. It has metal siding and a standing seam metal roof. Both outbuildings appear to date from the last quarter of the 19th century.

Wastler-Bartgis House, 10732 Wolfsville Road: The two-story log or frame dwelling was built about 1872-1878 and was consecutively owned by two shoemakers, David Wastler (1878-1888) and Albert W. Bartgis (1888-1909). The stone foundation on the south side of the road opposite the house is thought to

be the site of the shoemaking shop. The house has three bays with a one-story porch on the south elevation. The exterior is covered with aluminum siding on the second story and brick veneer on the first story. The 2/2 windows are flanked by replacement metal shutters. A two-story rear wing extends from the north side of the house with a one-story porch on the east elevation. An exterior brick chimney is on the east end of the main section. The roof is composition material. Two non-contributing concrete block outbuildings are located north and east of the house.

Summers Store, 10651 Wolfsville Road: The former Summers Store is now a private residence. Built about 1878, the frame or log building is covered with vinyl siding and has four bays on the west elevation with double entrances, one of which is now covered with siding. A one-story porch with brackets, a spindle frieze, and turned columns shelters the west elevation. The roof is covered with composition material and has interior end chimneys. The sash is 4/1 replacement. A two-story rear wing extends from the northeast corner of the house and a shed addition of recent date has been built on the east end of the wing. A frame summer kitchen is located southeast of the house. It has german siding and an exterior brick chimney, with a standing seam metal roof. The door in the west elevation is vertical boards. The History of Wolfsville states that the store may have been in existence by the Civil War; the title research does not confirm this, the earliest deed being 1882 with reference to a survey done in 1878. The store was supposed to have been originally operated by Washington Gaver and from 1882 to 1971, with intermittent closings, by the Summers family.






JACKSON DIST No. 16







Catoctin Election District



The Ellerton Survey District comprises the rural village established about 1865-70 at the crossing of the Myersville-Wolfsville road, now Wolfsville Road (Md. 17) at Middle Creek about 2 miles northeast of Myersville, Frederick County, Maryland. The district contains 5 dwellings, three of which have contributing outbuildings, a store and a creamery now used as storage structures, a small barn associated with the store, a circa 1900 portable iron steam engine formerly used in agricultural and industrial work, and a blacksmith shop currently used as an equipment shed. Fifteen (83%) of the 18 buildings contribute to the district's significance. The district is residential in use except for an engine repair shop in a non-contributing building near the center of the district. The buildings are located primarily on the north side of Middle Creek, with one dwelling, a former store with a contributing outbuilding, on the south side of the creek. Most of the buildings date from about 1870 to about 1900, and are vernacular in style with log, wood frame, and brick structure, with stone foundations. The stores retain german siding, but the other wood structures have composition, vinyl, or other artificial siding applied during the past 40 years. One of the dwellings is brick. The general condition of the buildings is good, although most have had some repair and replacement of windows, doors, porches, and roofs. At least 5 non-contributing structures are present, including the engine repair shop and several concrete block garages.

The village apparently developed as a result of the road crossing the creek, one of the links between Myersville and Wolfsville. The establishment of a general store by Thomas F. Bittle in 1868 appears to have been the anchor of the settlement, although the second store, the present 10651 Wolfsville Road, may have been in existence by the Civil War, according to The History of Wolfsville and the Catoctin District (p. 132). In the late 19th and early 20th century, the village had a school and at least one other shop. The school was a one-room building built about 1872 that was located on the north side of Wolfsville Road near the east end of the survey district; it was probably demolished in the 1930's. The shop was a shoemaker's store which stood on the south side of Wolfsville Road on the creek bank, probably the stone foundation near the east end of the district opposite 10732 Wolfsville Rd. This structure was demolished after 1950, but the exact date is unknown. The pattern of buildings responded to the junction of several roads at the creek crossing, the present Wolfsville, Harmony, and Harp Hill Roads. The relatively level topography of the northern bank may have been a key factor in the location of most of the buildings along the road paralleling the creek. The resulting layout of the district remains rather scattered, with open space between each dwelling and the houses back to open land or more recently subdivided house lots set back from Wolfsville Road.

Following are brief descriptions of the buildings in the survey district:

Thomas F. Bittle Store, west side of Harp Hill Road, north of bridge: The circa 1867-68 frame, two-story store building originally had an exposed stone foundation

The Ellerton Survey District exemplifies the development of a rural community in the period circa 1865 to 1940, including the common vernacular architectural style of the last quarter of the 19th century and the random plan responding to physical features and transportation networks which is characteristic of small villages. Ellerton developed from about 1865 to 1900, never growing much beyond its present general size. The district currently contains five dwellings and three formerly commercial buildings. The major losses in structures have been a shoemaker's shop and a school; however, the district has a well-preserved representative of a rural general store of the period, a late 19th century creamery, a much-altered blacksmith shop, and a former store now used as a residence. The dwellings have at least some log structure under modern siding, and three have contributing domestic outbuildings. The structures in the district have been altered primarily in their exterior finishes and in the rear wings of the dwellings, where kitchens and enclosed porches are common. The district also has a contributing engineering structure, a circa 1900 Frick "Eclipse" portable steam engine, which was used to run agricultural machines and saw mills at different locations in the vicinity. The two stores operated, sometimes with intermittent closings, from about 1868 to the early 1950's and an engine repair shop in a non-contributing building carries on the commercial activity which led to the establishment of Ellerton.

Thomas F. Bittle (1838-1917) established a general store at Ellerton in 1867-1868, the first documented commercial enterprise in the vicinity; however, a second general store may have been opened around the same time by Washington Gaver, although this has not been verified by land records and local histories. By 1882, the possible Gaver store was definitely established, being purchased by John F. Summers, whose family continued the business, with occasional periods of being closed, until 1971. The important creek crossing was a strategic choice for a business site as four roads met at the bridge and water power was available for milling and other needs. Although no mill buildings are located within the survey district, the 1873 Titus Atlas map shows that saw and grist mills were nearby on Middle Creek. Bittle's Store had a post office by the early 1880's and most of the farmers and other merchants had mail delivered to Ellerton. A school was built by 1873 and a blacksmith and a shoemaker both had shops in Ellerton by that year. Later in the 19th century, a creamery was run by a successor blacksmith, evidence of diversification of commercial activities. Albert W. Bartgis (1854-?) came to Ellerton as a shoemaker in about 1885 and later became a produce dealer. The
