DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Nathan Hammond House is a two and one half story random field stone residence which faces west from the east side of Rte 75 near New Market.

The principle facade is three bays wide; the main entrance, a replaced panelled door with one light transom is located in the second bay.

Occupying the remaining bays on the first and second levels are replaced 2/2 windows.

A decorative frame porch with dentiled cornice, scrolls and brackets is supported by boxed columns and extends across the first level of the building. Large stone quoins are located at each corner of the building which is banked and accomodates a full basment on the west side of the building.

The house is built on a low random stone foundation and is covered by a replaced tin roof (corrugated) with stepped brick cornice and plain frieze.

Two replaced single brick chimneys extend from the north and south gable ends.

The Nathan Hammond Houses is significant as the home of Nathan Hammond, a member of the Hammond family which settled this area of Frederick County according to research complete by H.H. Hopkins. The house is located on the 1808 Varle Map of the area.

Although the house has been updated with numerous Victorian changes it retains many of the simple characteristics typical of field stone residences of the late 18th century in the New Market area.


