The Mount-Hendrickson House is a two-story frame house built about 1856 by Sarah Mount. In its original form, it had a four-bay main elevation with double entrances, and a two-story rear wing. In 1898, William E. Hendrickson purchased the property and made several alterations to update the appearance of the house. These were the shingled cross gables on the main elevation and the wing, finials at the gable peaks, a wide veranda with Tuscan columns extending on two elevations, and a modified projecting bay in the north gable end of the main section. A mid-20th century alteration added the present stucco exterior covering. The house has two associated outbuildings, a hipped roof meathouse, and a frame summer kitchen. The house is minimally significant in architecture for its exemplification of some of the typical alterations to early and mid-19th century dwellings in the late 19th century which reflect stylistic changes incorporating the Queen Anne and Shingle styles.

The Mount-Hendrickson House is a two-story frame vernacular dwelling built in about 1856 with extensive alterations in the late 1890's in the Queen Anne style, located on the north side of Browningsville Road just west of the intersection of Lawson Road near Kempton, Frederick County, Maryland. The house currently has a stucco exterior, probably covering German siding. Also associated with the house is a small frame meathouse dating from the 1890's and a one-story frame building at the edge of the public road which may have been a summer kitchen, also dating from about the late 1890's. The principal elevation of the dwelling faces west and the house is located about 35 yards north of Browningsville Road. The dates of the buildings are based on architectural details, land records, and historical maps.

The dwelling in its original form when owned by Sarah Mount in the late 1850's was apparently a two-story, four-bay house with double entrances on the main elevation, a gable roof, and a two-story rear wing extending from the northeast corner. Its structure may include some log, but this is not confirmed by personal interviews or observation. In 1898, William E. Hendrickson purchased the house and presumably made several alterations to the house. The central cross gable may have been extant, but a matching cross gable on the north side of the rear wing is a feature more commonly seen in late 19th century houses. The gables have shingle surfaces and round-arched windows. Their matching features suggest that both were added in the late 19th century. The originally flat north gable end of the main section was bowed slightly with a center corner giving the two window bays an obtusely angled wall plane. The roof was covered with standing seam metal and the metal sheets extend over the altered gable profile on the north end. Wood finials were added to the peaks of the gables. An off-center corbeled chimney is located near the junction of the cross gable and the main roof ridge. A wide veranda with a prominent entablature and Tuscan columns was built on the west and north elevations, following the angled profile of the altered north gable end and extending over the north side of the rear wing. The view of the house from the south is the best representation of its original form, although alterations to the exterior wall surface and the enclosure of a porch on the wing have changed its appearance. The south end of the main section has a single center bay with 2/2 windows flanked by louvered shutters. A single 2/2 attic window is above the second floor window. A wood finial is at the peak of the gable roof, undoubtedly added when the east and north cross gables were built. The wing appears to have had a two-story open porch which has been enclosed on the second story with horizontal siding. The first story has an extended and enclosed porch. The interior of the house was inaccessible for this survey.

Meathouse: A one-story square plan building located southeast of the house was possibly erected prior to the late 1890's, but the hipped roof has a finial matching those of the gables on the house, suggesting that its present appearance dates from the late 1890's period of alterations to the property. The exterior is covered with vertical boards and a single board door is in the west elevation. A 3/3 window is in the south elevation. The roof is covered with composition material.

The Mount-Hendrickson House is minimally significant in architecture for the vernacular style of the dwelling which shows the variations often added to mid 19th century and earlier buildings in the late 19th century to give an updated appearance and which reflect the changes in domestic life in rural areas. The original house was built in the late 1850's, probably by Sarah Mount (1812-1897), although it does not appear on the 1858 map. Her name is on the 1873 map. In its original form, the house had a typical form associated with German building traditions throughout Frederick County: a main section with double entrances, a perpendicular rear wing, and a probable two-level open porch on the wing. In 1898, the Mount heirs sold the property to William E. Hendrickson, who added the cross gables, finials, the encircling veranda, and the slightly bowed north gable. These were common elements in the eclectic late 19th century vernacular styles which incorporated many historical sources, in this case, the Queen Anne and Shingle styles. Descendants of Hendrickson retained the property until the late 1970's. During the mid-20th century, a covering of stucco was applied to the exterior, probably concealing the original siding which was probably of the German type.

7.1 Description (Continued)

Summer kitchen: The frame building located south of the dwelling at the edge of Browningsville Road was probably built in the 1890's as a summer kitchen, although its distance from the house is unusual for this type of building. It has a rectangular plan with clapboard siding and a corrugated metal roof. An interior end chimney is at the north end, flanked by a single vertical board door. The east and west elevations each have two 2/2 windows and a single window is in the south elevation. The building is currently used for storage.




