Casper Devilbiss

The Casper Devilbiss House is a two and one-half story ell shaped rubble stone residence which was built in two parts.

The original and oldest part occupies the two west bays of the main facade. An unusual feature of the building is a fieldstone water table which is continued in the new addition to the east side.

An etched stone located in the center of the gable decorated by a six pointed star with the initials "MSS 1771" indicated the building date of the house.

The interior of this section of the building retains much of its original woodwork including beaded baseboards, over mantel paneling, corner fireplaces, deep window paneling, and arched built-in cupboard.

A frame bank barn, log outbuilding covered with tin, and wagon shed are also located on the premises.

The Devilbiss family acquired the property upon which the residence is located in the second half of the eighteenth century and willed the six hundred and fifty acres of Leonards Range to his son, Casper, at his death in 1777.

Casper Devilbiss is believed to have lived in the house until his death in 1835, willing the land and property to his three sons, Casper, Levi, and Thomas. It was this owner who probably built the east addition. Just prior to his death the land tract was resurveyed in 1834 by D. W. Neill and renamed "Caspers Loss."

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Casper Devilbiss House is a two and a half story ell shaped rubble stone residence which faces south from the south side of Oak Orchard Rd.

The house, which was built in two parts, is five bays wide. The original and oldest part occupies the two west bays of the main facade. The original entrance, a replaced four panel door with three light transom, is located in the second bay on the first level. A double hung 9/6 window with storm window occupies the first bay on the first level. Double hung 6/6 windows are located in each bay on the second level and in both bays on the west gable end which is two bays deep. Two identical windows are located to the rear of the original part of the house. The walls are constructed of rubble stone with narrow fieldstone quoins. An unusual feature of the building is a fieldstone water table which is continued in the new addition to the east side. The building is covered by a replaced standing seam tin roof with a plain boxed cornice with pent roof which continues across the west gable of the building. This architectural feature is characteristic of German colonial architecture. An etched stone located in the center of the gable decorated by a six pointed star with the initials "M S S 1771" probably indicates the building date of the house. An original double brick chimney extends from the west gable end of the building.

The interior of this section of the building retains much of its original woodwork including beaded baseboards, over mantel paneling, corner fireplaces, deep window paneling, and arched built-in cupboard. Wide random width flooring is intact on both the first and second levels although the staircase has been considerably altered.

The east four bay wide section with rear two story addition appears to have been added in the first quarter of the nineteenth century although the interior woodwork, fireplace and unusual inverted T-shape wall hanging suggest that this part of the addition may date to the original west section of the house.

The facade of the east section is three bays wide. A replaced paneled door with three light transom occupies the third bay. Both the second and third bays have been covered with novelty siding on the first level and covered by a modern shed roof frame porch.

Occupying the remaining two bays on the first level are 9/6 windows covered by storm windows with wood lintels. Double hung 6/6 windows are located in all bays on the second level. The walls of the addition are constructed with rubble stone with narrow fieldstone quoins in the southeast and northeast corners similar to the west section. The east elevation is five bays wide. Each bay is occupied by 6/6 windows with wood lintels.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Casper Devilbiss House was owned by the same family until 1978 when the current owners purchased the property.

The Devilbiss Family acquired the property upon which the residence is located in the second half of the eighteenth century and willed the six hundred and fifty acres of Leonards Range to his son, Casper, at his death in 1777.¹

Casper Devilbiss is believed to have lived in the house until his death in 1835, willing the land and property to his three sons, Casper, Levi, and Thomas.² It was this owner who probably built the east addition. Just prior to his death the land tract was resurveyed in 1834 by D. W. Neill and renamed "Caspers Loss".

When the third Casper Devilbiss to live in the house died in 1868, he directed his executors to sell all real and personal property except his "wife and family carry on said farm called 'Caspers Loss'."³

In 1871 the farm was sold to Darius Devilbiss for \$9,955.00 who owned the property just three short years before selling it to William Ensor,⁴ a member of the Devilbiss Family.

Upon his death in 1899, he willed all his "outdoor goods, horses, cattle, and swine" to his sons and daughters and all his indoor property to his wife, Mary.⁵

The farm remained in the Ensor Family and was incorporated in 1963.

The stone water table and interior woodworking which has remained intact makes this a building of considerable significance. While displaying a German floor plan, the woodworking of the house shows English influence creating a mix of the two cultures in one building, a common occurrence in Frederick County.

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DESCRIPTION

The Casper Devilbiss House (continued)

Two rear entrances and whitewashing on the north wall of the addition suggest that a shed roofed addition once extended to the rear.

A modern one story frame shed roof porch extends from the west side of the addition. A single original brick chimney extends from the east gable of the addition; a central chimney rises from the center of the rear addition.

Except for the existence of a large cooking fireplace, the interior of this section of the house has been considerably altered over the years.

A frame bank barn, log outbuilding covered with tin, and wagon shed are also located on the premises.




