The Stanley E. Green Farm consists of a frame dwelling, a frame bank barn, a log chicken house, several frame outbuildings, a cemetery, and a small frame dwelling that was moved from another site.

The main house is a two story, square plan with a cross gable roof. Its facade is four bays wide, the two center bays being occupied by transomed doorways. Scars on the walls indicate that a porch formerly extended across the facade and continued around to one of the endwalls.

The chicken house is a 23' by 13', v-notched log building with a shed roof.

The barn is supported by a machine sawn post and rail frame on a stone foundation.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Stanley E. Green Farm is located on the north side of Avilton-Lonaconing Road approximately .7 mile southeast of Swamp Road. The site consists of a dwelling, a frame bank barn, a log chicken house, several frame outbuildings, a small frame dwelling moved there from another site and a cemetery.

The main house is a frame, two story building with a cross gable roof. It is rectangular in plan measuring 4 bays by 2 bays. The four bay facade (SE elevation) is symmetrically arranged with two center doors, both topped by transom lights. The side and rear elevations all have symmetrical two bay arrangements of 1 over 1 sash windows. Additionally, each of the four gables is pierced by a rectangular window. A scar on the building indicates that a porch formerly extended across the facade and continued around to the first bay on the southwest elevation. The only structural member of the porch that remains is a pilaster in the form of a half-round Tuscan column. A small, one story, gable-roofed wing on the northeast elevation is a later addition to the building.

The house rests on a foundation of coursed, roughly squared stone. Its frame is sheathed with diagonal board and covered with German siding and corner pilasters. A layer of asphalt shingles now covers the wood siding, however. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles and has a box cornice with a plain board frieze and partial returns on the northeast and southwest gables. Two interior brick stove chimneys are located on the NW-SE ridgeline.

The bank barn, which lies southeast of the house, sits on a coursed, squared stone foundation. Its frame is post and rail construction with upbracing at each post. The timber is machine sawn and held together by wire nails. The barn is gable-roofed and has vertical board siding. A concrete block, pyramidal-roofed milkhouse stands just east of the barn.

Southeast of the house, halfway to the barn, is the location of the log chicken house. It is a shed-roofed structure with dimensions 13' by 23'. The logs are hewn on their interior and exterior wall surfaces and are V-notched. Chinking consists of small stones and clay with pieces of split log and boards wedged in the larger spaces. A batten door and a continuous row of four windows light the south elevation. A pair of four-pane windows pierces the east endwall. Approximately eight feet south of this building is a balloon frame chicken house with a gable roof and vertical board siding.



G-I-C-088 Stanley E. Green Farm

Southwest of the main house is the site of a smaller dwelling that was moved here on rollers from an undetermined site west of this location "up on the hill." The date of the move is unknown. This house is a frame, two-story, gable-roofed building on a coursed stone foundation. It measures two bays by one bay and has a one-story shed addition on both the facade (SW elevation) and rear (NE elevation). The interior was remodeled ca. 1940.

Northeast of the barn is a small private cemetery that dates from the 1930's. The families interred there are: Bittinger, Broadwater, Buskirk, Green, and Whiteman.
