Milestone No. ---(221), south of the village of Markleysburg, Pennsylvania, is the westernmost of the 1902 monuments added to the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary during the 1900-03 Resurvey, and marks a point a little more than 195 miles west of the northeast corner of Maryland, the beginning of Mason and Dixon's 230.228-mile West Line, the English provincial boundary later known as the Mason-Dixon Line, famous for its historical impact and innovative survey methods. The monument is a very plain dressed marble post with a low pyramidal top, quarried and carved in Cockeysville, Maryland. It is in excellent condition, unaltered, firmly in place; measures 10 inches square by 16 inches high above ground; and is embellished only by the capital letter P on the north side facing Pennsylvania, M on the south side facing Maryland, the year 1767 on the east side (when this part of the Line was originally surveyed and marked), and 1902 on the east side (when this new monument was set at a site established by the Resurvey). On the national and state levels, No. ---(221) is significant primarily as one of the thematic group series of some 248 markers still visually defining the West Line. Locally, as one of some 42 markers along the present Garrett/Somerset-Fayette county boundary, it is also significant symbolically for its identifiable relationship to the colonial and Civil War heritage of these counties.

Milestone No. ---(221), the westernmost of the 1902 monuments added to the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary during the 1900-03 Resurvey, marks a point a little more than 195 miles west of the northeast corner of Maryland, the beginning of Mason and Dixon's West Line. It is ^{a dressed Cockeyville marble post with a low pyramidal top,} in excellent condition, unaltered, firmly in place; measures 10 inches square by about 16 inches high above ground; and is embellished only by the capital letter P on the north side facing Pennsylvania, M on the south side facing Maryland, the year 1767 on the east side (when this part of the Line was originally surveyed and marked), and 1902 on the west side (when this new monument was set at a site established by the Resurvey).

The area here is high, wooded, ^{and} appears to be a northeastern finger of Thomas Ridge (elevation at the site about 2180 feet), with no houses in sight. The site is within Election District 2 of Garrett County, MD, and Henry Clay Township of Fayette County, PA; about 1 mile south of the town of Markleysburg, PA; about 1 1/4 miles north-northwest of the scattered settlement of Asher Glade, MD; about 4350 feet due west of MD 42/LR-26067 at the line; at a point about 43 feet south of the old pipeline, in the middle of the ^{partially farmed} rather broad ridge, just inside a lovely deciduous woods. It cannot be seen from any road, farm lane, or the pipeline, and is well hidden from sight even ^{when} closeby. The ^{remoteness of the} site seems protective, as are the property owners.

The monument, identical to 65 other monuments of 1902 set west of Sideling Hill to visually reestablish the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary, is of an off-white ^{quarried and carved in Cockeyville, MD,} fine-grained marble called saccharoidal dolomite or magnesian limestone, and was originally cut about 10 inches square by about 4 1/2 feet long, intended for standing about 1 1/2 feet high above ground with the remaining 3 feet for setting into the ground in order to eliminate the need for ^{securing with} a concrete foundation. The letters and numbers are blocky, V-sunk without serifs, and are horizontally aligned as a band around the stone near the top. These, and the top planes and apex, are all clear and intact; though there is a chip in the top southeast corner, nicks along the vertical edges; and most of the bottom half is covered by a dark moss, with lichen sprinkled over the rest of the stone.

This part of the Line was surveyed and marked in 1767, and the new monument set at an additional site on the Line established in 1902 during the 1900-03 Resurvey of the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary. Locally, as one of some 42 markers along the present Garrett/Somerset-Fayette county boundary, No. ---(221) is also significant symbolically for its identifiable relationship to the colonial and Civil War heritage of these counties.




