DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Gaughen property contains several agrarian structures, all now abandoned and in various states of disrepair. These buildings include a corn crib, a barn and pole shed and a springhouse (still standing); as well as a frame storage shed, a hay barn, a stable (all razed within the last ten years). The farmhouse to which they pertained was demolished by DNR since 1973. It was apparently a three-bay wide, two story stone house with frame additions to both gable ends. An earlier MHT survey form described it as follows:

"This three-part house is stone in the center, with two chimneys at the ends of this section, and a frame section on either end. The house faces east--the ridgeline runs north-south. The south wing has two bays by two, the stone section is three bays, the north section two bays by two. Frame sections have asphalt shingles over clapboard. A long one-story porch runs along the east and south sides of the house. Windows throughout are six lights over six except for a bay window in the northwest corner of the house."

The corn crib, a nineteenth century survivor, is a frame structure, sheathed in vertical planks and painted red with a gable roof covered in standing seam tin replacement material. It possesses a floor plan common to area corn cribs: a central aisle, or passage large enough to accommodate a wagon, flanked by open slat storage racks for corn on either side. It is a two-story structure, its framing members are all hand hewn, mortised and tenoned and pegged.

The principal west entrance facade contains the wide doorway to the mow (sheltered by a tin sheathed, shed-roofed canopy) and narrow vertical spaces between the boards sheathing on the first story to ventilate the contents of the crib. The second story, accessible via a flight of stairs on the south side of the mow, is lit by two window openings flanking a doorway on the center of the front; on the east facade the first floor carriage way is surmounted by two second story window openings. Underbrush obscures much of the longitudinal sides of the building which are sheathed as described above and unfenestrated.

Four parallel stone foundation walls underlie the hewn sill into which are mortised four supporting posts along each exterior side and to each side of the mow. Two additional verticals frame the east doorway and two more the west doorway and stair. Posts are 7" X 7-1/2" oak.

To the northwest of this corn crib is a pole shed featuring chamfered post in the ground construction, adjacent to a silo in ruinous condition. Also in ruins to the east of the corn crib in a heavily wooded area is a frame springhouse on stone foundation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The following information is quoted from material collected by Paul Penrod in 1976. The title search attached was also executed by him at that time.

This former stone house with frame additions once stood on a tract of land which included portions of two major tracts in the Susquehanna area, "The Land of Promise" and "Line's Tents." The former, owned by Nathaniel Giles in the 1770s, was later conveyed to the Govers (see attached title search) while the latter belonged to Thomas Harrison until 1783 when most of it was sold to John Stump. Subsequently John Stump sold part of this tract to George Stevenson whose family owned it until the Ann Archer trustees purchased same in the 1870s.

Like the Gardner property (HA-204) another dwelling built by descendants of John Stump, this two-story stone farmhouse was probably built in the first quarter of the nineteenth century. Its impressive collection of outbuildings, particularly the 19th century corn crib, attest to its area prominence and the attendant farm's prosperity.

The fairly sound condition of the corn crib which features a complete demonstration of traditional construction methods for this indigenous agrarian building type is a strong factor pointing towards its preservation by moving it to the grounds of the Steppingstone farm museum.

The Gaughen corncrib/wagon shed is a frame structure built in a representative pattern for wagon shed-corncribs throughout central Maryland. It is a two-story structure with a central aisle flanked by open slat storage racks for corn on either side. The structure is constructed on stone piers that run the full length of the corncrib leaving an open area for ventilation underneath the crib section. The frame is constructed of hand hewn members connected with mortise and tenons which are pegged. A board vertical sheathing tightly spaced together is found around the structure except for the east and west gable ends of the crib sections ^{and the central sections of the north and south facades} where the board sheathing is about one inch apart. The gable roof has exposed rafter ends and is covered in sheet metal.

The east and west gable ends have a central wagon ^{bay} opening ~~centrally located~~ in the facade. The wagon opening on the east facade contains a tin-shethed, shed-roofed canopy. On the second story of the gable ends are doorways flanked by windows. The north facade is unfenestrated while the south facade has one small window. The interior of the crib has a wood floor along the aisle. Posts run on either side of the aisle and horizontal board siding separates the cribs from the aisle. The aisle contains joists running across to provide a floor on the second story while the cribs remain opened to a roof. The second story is accessible via a flight of stairs from the south side of the aisle. The framing system has down-bracing on its upper members.


The structure has four framing sections: one at each end and two towards the center which support principle purlins that carry three-by-three common rafters that are nailed at the ridge.

Significance: The Gaughen Corncrib is a period structure illustrating corncrib construction techniques and use of the late nineteenth century. The Gaughen Corncrib is an example of the large size of these structures and their use and other functions such as a wagon shed. The construction techniques, framing sections, and floor plan are typical of this type of outbuilding on many farms in central Maryland.







- top - East & North Facades





Framing Section







The house that once stood on this site probably dates from the Nineteenth Century, perhaps the very early Nineteenth Century. The tract itself consisted of parts of "The Land of Promise" and "Line's Tents". The former tract was owned by Nathaniel Giles in the 1770's and later came into the hands of the Govers, while the latter one was owned by Thomas Harrison until 1783 when most of it was purchased by John Stump. John Stump sold a portion of this tract to a George Stevenson, and it remained in that family until the 1870's, when it was acquired by the Ann Archer trustees.






