DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two story brick building with a hipped roof is at 119 S. Main Street in the Town of Bel Air, Harford County, Maryland. The front (west) elevation is divided into three bays, a fact obscured by the second story enclosed porch which is supported by four Roman Doric columns in the first story. Similar columns are engaged at the ends of the facade. The upstairs porch has a wooden shingle body topped by 6 double-hung sash windows, three vertical panes over one. This is topped by a cornice with a dentil band. The porch looks so handsomely shingle style that one may theorize it to be a later addition. The 1904 insurance map shows no porch. The original windows in the building are all the older 6/6 double-hung sash. Two entrances in the extremes of the north and south bays flank a center window set in moulded surround with a wooden sill. All the windows are so set in. The first floor porch is completed by a wrought iron balustrade. About 25 feet of the building is two story; the rest is a single story with an enclosed frame porch on the rear (east) elevation. The one story portion has a sloping flat roof. There are two plain chimneys, one between the middle and east bay on the south elevation and one midway in the same elevation in the single story section.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This long, narrow brick building is not the first home of the Aegis, but it is the first building built expressly for the paper. Changed and added to over the hundred years of its life, this building is now in only fair shape, but it retains a certain raffish charm.

The Southern Aegis was founded in 1856 by John Carroll Walsh and John Cox. The newspaper was vociferously southern in sympathy. Cox (who died of acute indigestion in 1897) became the sole owner in 1859. He was an editor of the old school, violent in his sympathies and in his editorials. His editorial sarcasm at the American Party (the "Know-Nothings") cost him the county printing, and his slashing comments about fellow editors whether whig or Democrat were legend. As a sample of his old fashioned Jacksonian style, this is his comment about the (Bel Air) National American in 1858 when Richard Bouldin purchased it and handed it over to Frank Barr to run: "We welcome Mr. B. to the ring, feeling assured that in his hands the frog will reach as near to the dimensions of the ox as the elasticity of its skin will allow". Definite echoes of Mark Twain's ironic style continued to flavor Cox's journalism, showing that good old fashioned American humor was not confined to the West. It is not known where the first home of the Aegis was, but in November 1859 Cox announced that he had moved to the "Town Hall across from the Courthouse" possibly in the building marked "Democrat Print" (approximately on the site of the Red Fox today) on the 1858 map. In the same issue, after announcing that he had lost a local political campaign, he accused Bouldin of the American of stuffing the ballot box. As the Civil War drew closer he became more violent in his southern sympathies, calling for secession in April of 1861. In October he supported a "Peace and States' Rights" ticket. He was dismayed when Harford voted a Lincoln Union ticket and printed the Virginia and Kentucky Resolutions (the work of Jefferson and James Madison and the ideological basis of states' rights and secession) in reply. It was clear that a man of such temperament would not be able to publish during the hostilities. He handed the editorial reins to Alfred W. Bateman in March 1862. Bateman continued in the office until 1864 when Frederick W. Baker became editor. At that time the paper was printed in the brick Jarrett Building. This building, built by A. L. Jarrett on land leased from Pamela Hays, daughter of Thomas, was on Office Street. Actually, it still is. When the Harford Mutual Fire Insurance Company renovated and enlarged its office in 1930, the

old building was completely surrounded by the expanded and enlarged building. Baker, equally vociferous in his southern sympathies, was, nevertheless, a more discreet man. It was only after the war was over that he began to write violently about the federal government. Reconstruction left him nearly -- but not quite -- speechless with rage. The Aegis could be counted upon to be anti-black and conservatively Democratic at all times.

In 1871 Baker leased the lot on which this building stands from William Oldfield for \$55 a year (26/20) and built the brick portion of this building, moving the Aegis there. The newspaper remained there until 1905 when it moved to the "Old Aegis Building" at 29 Courtland.

Baker continued to run the paper until 1894 when he sold it to Frank E. Gorrell. After the Redemption of Maryland, Baker continued to support the conservative wing of the remergent Democratic Party, but as time passed he became milder in his strictures on the Republicans as it became clear that the latter party had no ghost of a chance in solidly Democratic Harford County.

Gorrell kept the paper for five years and sold it to Walter Finney and Louis Dashiell. They in turn sold it to John D. Worthington, Sr., in 1904. The paper has been edited by Worthingtons ever since. In 1962 the Aegis moved to its large new quarters on Hays Street. Since the Second World War several papers have been merged with the Aegis. The paper is, today, the most influential weekly in Harford County.

As for the old building, Baker retained the lease, even after he moved to Richmond. He sold the lease in 1908 to William F. Hays and Joseph T. Deckman for \$261 (125/140), a seemingly low price for a brick building. In 1911 in the general collapse of Deckman's financial empire, he sold his share to George A. Hays (134/285). In 1919 the Hays brothers sold the lease to John F. Finneran and his wife, Eugenia, for \$2583.39 (166/150).

The fee remained in William Oldfield's hands until 1911, when he sold it to James J. Archer as trustee for Elizabeth Archer Bruen (134/270). After James Archer's death, Mrs. Bruen sued to regain her property (equity 134/170). In 1922 she received the deed to this lot (178/162). In 1929 she sold the fee to the Finnerans, who had held the lease since 1919. Mrs. Finneran lives there today.





