DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a rather massive stone structure that faces southward, with walls of coursed rubble stone and quoined corners. The building is L-shaped, with a wing on the north-west side of the northern exposure. The main section is four bays by two, while the wing is three by two. There are two attic windows on each end of the main section and one on the north end of the wing. These attic windows, along with those on the first floor wing, are 2 X 2's, while the rest are 6 X 6. The doors are coupled, with one set being on the southern side and the other pair being located on the western embrasure of the wing. There is also a door in a wood inset on the eastern facade of the wing with stone steps. It appears that the doors and the windows are of recent vintage. The roof is gable-flank with slate shingles and underneath the eaves is a new box cornice. Three original brick chimneys are located on the roof, two of these being ~~flush~~ flush-ends on the eastern and western extremes of the main house and the third being an interior stack on the ridgeline of the wing. The remains of two stone porches are still visible. The larger one encompasses the the whole southern wall and had a hip roof. The other fronted the doorways on the western side of the wing. A single cellar window is situated on the northeast corner of the main house and the cellar entrance is located on the western wall of the larger section. Underneath the western chimney is the inscription, "June 26th 1849".

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This is one of several old Hughes homes that were built by the several generations of Hughes's that lived in the area. The house was built in 1849 by Amos Hughes, although the land had been in the family since the beginning of the Nineteenth Century. This tract was part of the parcel called "Wightrupp" that was sold to John Hughes and his relatives by Samuel Gover during the early 1800's.

SUSSQUEHANNA STATE PARK PROPERTIES

Eightrupp- Tydings Portion

Libre Folio

HDC 903 81 In 1972, Robert C. Brennaman and Donald H. Gilson sold a tract of 119.011 acres to Joseph Tydings.

GRG 637 108 Aris P. Blevins, in 1963, sold to Robert C. Brennaman and Donald H. Gilson 121.41 acres of this section of Eightrupp.

GRG 476 139 A 1957 deed transferring the property from William P. Boyle, Jr. to Aris P. Blevins showed it to equal 121.41 acres.

GRG 407 433 In 1953, Oscina Mitchell sold this section of Eightrupp,, then consisting of 133.51 acres, to William P. Boyle, Jr.

DGW 208 ~~159~~ In 1928, Fred Lawder, a trustee, sold to Edwin Mitchell 158 ~~acres~~ that once belonged to an Amos H. Hughes, who died in 1921.(Will CHR 18 215). According to this deed, the portion of land owned by Amos H. Hughes that contained tracts of Eightrupp came from three sources. Amos H. Hughes had been left this land by his father, also named Amos H. Hughes. This transfer was in 1884.

First Part

HDC 34 ~~190~~ In 1848, John Hughes gave to his son, Amos H. Hughes, 100 acres which included a part of Eightrap.

HDR R 85 In 1803, John Hughes bought from Isaac Whitaker a 5-acre and 38 perch piece of Eyetrap. Presumably, this was included in John Hughes' tract that was sold to Amos H. Hughes. Isaac Whitaker appears in other transactions before 1803, although none of them involved Eightrupp.

Second Part

WG ~~111~~ ~~1004~~ In 1859, Mary Hughes, widow of Everett S. Hughes, sold 100 acres to Amos H. Hughes, including part of Eyetrap.

HDW W 406 Samuel Gover sold a portion of Eightrap, amounting to 18 acres, 20 perches to Everett S. Hughes in 1812.

HD T 582 Samuel Gover, in 1808, purchased 25 acres, including parts of Eightrap, from his mother, Hannah, wife of the late Samuel Gover, Sr.

JIG N 467 Gerrard Gover sold to Samuel Gover a 273 and three-quarter acre tract that included Eightrap and several other tracts. This transaction took place in 1797, making Gerrard Gover the earliest-known owner of this portion of Eightrupp.

Third Part

ALJ 49 457 In 1883, J. Scott Hughes sold fifteen and three-quarters acres of Eyetrap to Amos H. Hughes.

ALJ 37 397 In 1878, Everitt G. Hughes bought the beforementioned segment of Eyetrap from Evan J. Hughes. J. Scott was possibly a son or a brother of Everitt J. Hughes, for ALJ 49 457 mentions Everitt G. Hughes as a previous owner.

ALJ 30 422 John Hall Hughes sold this part of Eyetrap to Evan J. Hughes in 1874.

HD 5 157 James Hughes mortgaged the property, declared here to be 100 acres, more or less, to Scott Hughes in 1821. This parcel included Eyetrap. Between 1821 and 1874 the property was prob-ably kept within the Hughes family. This tract was given to James by John H. Hughes.

John H. Hughes acquired the Eightrupp parcel from four different sources.

Gover

JIG P 368 John H. Hughes purchased a 3 acre, 130 perch tract of Eightrap from Samuel Gover in 1800. The deed mentions that previous to Gover's ownership some of Eightrap had been part of Reuben Perkins' land and called Perkins' Valley.

Stump

JIG O 211 John H. Hughes in 1798 purchased a ten and three-quarter acre section of Eightrapp from Henry Stump.

Giles

JIG K 502 In 1796, John H. Hughes purchased 108½ acres, more or less, of Eightrip from Thomas Giles, executor for the estate of the late Jacob Giles.

Brown

JIG K 469 In 1790, John Hall Hughes purchased from Freeborn Brown



Eyetrapp, once owned by the Durbin family. This plot consisted Of 69 acres and 10 perches.

JIG K 469

In 1790, Freeborn Brown purchased from Samuel Osborn, a trustee for Thomas Durbin, 69 and three-quarter acres of Eyetrapp. The deed goes on to say that in 1770, Francis Durbin purchased this part of Eyetrapp from Thomas Durbin (Baltimore County Land Records Libre AL, No. B, Folio 484 and Libre A No. C, Folio 628). Francis died in 1770, while the next owner, John Durbin, was killed in the Revolutionary War. The next owner, Thomas Durbin, was sued for debt and imprisoned, initiating this sale to Brown.


