DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two-story frame double tenant house, presently vacant, is located on the west wide of Lodge Alley, in the middle of the block. It is a detached rectangular building with a two-story shed roof addition on the rear forming a T-shape plan. Built of wide clapboards on a low stone foundation, the building is without paint except for one small section of the south wall. The building is four bays wide with three bays on the second floor. There are no windows on the main block northern and southern elevations, or on the west wall of the wing. All the windows display original pegged sash; most are six-on-six light double-hung. Entrance doors, located in the outside bays of the facade (east elevation), are sheltered by crude hoods on brackets. The doors are three-paneled, the top panel being replaced with glass. Shed roof porches project from the north and south elevation of the addition supported by thin square posts. The house has a low tarpaper-covered gable roof with the ridge running north to south. A small chimney is located in the center of the roof ridge.

Behind the house there is an outhouse built of vertical boards; it has four doors.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This simple frame alley house, of which there are many worth saving in Havre de Grace, has a very pleasant location. On the east it looks across Lodge Alley facing the lawns and gardens of houses that front on South Washington Street; none of these backyards are fenced. Behind the house are more backyards, these belonging to houses that front on South Union Avenue. To the south is a board and batten stable Church with a gambrel roof; to the north is the spired skyscape of the Methodist Church.

The alleys in Havre de Grace provide a second network of streets that are used for the most part by pedestrian traffic. The small size and simplicity of the structures along the alley contribute to the restful feeling characteristic of these alleys. It is also from the alleys that one gets the best view of the magnificent flower and vegetable gardens that punctuate the green space typical of the town.
