DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Lombardy is one of the great Colonial Revival dwellings of 1930 composed of a large scale five bay, two and one-half story frame block with one and one-half story hyphens and two story wings. The detailing is superior and comparable to Canterbury Manor and other Talbot houses of the period.

Northeast of the main dwelling is an earlier brick house, with a nearly equal view south looking down Miles River. The older house has a 'T' plan and both sections are one and one-half story tall, although the rear is lower than the front portion. Its south facade is three bays long laid in Flemish bond. It presently has a late 19th century entrance with side-lights and transom opening from the covered passage which connect it with the house. Originally the structure had a central door. It has no water table or box cornice. The two windows have 9/6 sash and there are two dormers on the 'A' roof with 6/6 sash. In the east gable rises a large brick chimney. Like the south, the east gable is laid in Flemish bond. On the first story is a single window north of the fireplace. Beneath the window is the entrance to the basement.

At the rear of the building is a three bay long extension, also of brick. It is bonded into the front section to about floor level, but is butted to the front section from there up. The back section is laid in a variety of English and common bonds. On the first floor is a door closest to the front part, on both sides. Two windows light each side. Several seams in the wall suggests locations for different doors and windows. On the gable is a large brick chimney. On each side three dormer windows pierce the cornice line, probably the product of 20th century alterations. Also, the brick work above the level of the second floor suggests the possibility that part of the wall was added.

In the basement of the front portion is a small kitchen fireplace similar in size and plan to the small fireplace at Enniskillen and the William Knight House, both early 19th century dwellings. There is also a herringbone brick floor.

Nothing remains inside from the early period except portions of the structure which are partly covered.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Lombardy has an unusual plan for an early 19th century dwelling. Having a 'T' plan is like only Otwell which predates this house by nearly 100 years. The presence of a basement kitchen is unusual for a country house where there was room for outbuildings. Little of the interior remains from the time it was first built, however, it possess many good exterior original details as well as the fact that it is incorporated into the 1930 house.
