DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This log house stands on the south side of White's Store Road in the southeast corner of its junction with Barnesville Road. The front of the house faces north.

Due to a recent fire which gutted the east side of the house, the house is now abandoned. Though the grounds around it are no longer attended, the plantings of flowers and shrubs show that they were once well cared for when the house was occupied.

The house stands one and a half stories high. Its facade consists of three bays, a front door centrally located flanked by two windows. The windows have double hung sashes with 6 x 6 panes. The facade is sheltered with a shed porch that is a rather recent addition. The logs, which had once been exposed and whitewashed like the walls of most log houses, had been covered with asphalt siding for insulation and for an improved appearance since the siding was manufactured in the color and form of tan bricks.

The gable roof is covered with tin today, but it was originally covered with wood shingles. Neither gable end have windows. Along the exterior of the eastern gable end ascends a cinder block stove flue.

It is that end that was burned, and the logs in the walls are revealed underneath the asphalt siding. They are pine, hewn only on the lateral sides, and are V-notched at the corners. The V-notch is a common type in this area, having also been found on the Louis Brown and Fred Hamilton houses in the Big Woods community nearby. The spaces between the logs are filled with carefully aligned, narrow stones and strips of wood. There was no evidence of the logs being pegged together, nor were they supported by upright posts as log houses of Black families commonly were in southern Maryland.

In plan, the house contained one room down and two up. There was a narrow boxed stairway that led to the upstairs in the northwest corner of the downstairs room. The interior of the downstairs was probably white-washed originally. Due to the dangerous condition of the house, the interior was not investigated thoroughly.

To the northeast of the house was the old well, which has been covered over.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This log house cannot be specifically dated because the interior could not be carefully examined for datable, structural evidence, nor do written records provide sufficient evidence for the purpose. There is no deed for the land. Instead, the property was willed to Mary Smith by William White in 1937 (Will, HGC 17/257), and that will is the document of certifying ownership. The will states that White conveyed the land to Mary Smith in recognition of "her splendid service". She had been a servant of White, and this land represented a token of payment and esteem. It is most likely that she had been living in this house prior to his leaving it to her. Since it had probably been a tenant house, land records will not furnish a date. From the design of the house and structural details -- such as the presence of the stove flue instead of a fireplace and chimney and double hung sash windows with 6 x 6 panes -- it is most likely that the house was built after the Civil War, probably in the last two decades of the 19th century, contemporary to the other log houses being constructed by landowning Black families in communities nearby.

The house is a fine example of a traditional log house of the postbellum era. Since we do not know the original occupants -- whether landowners or tenants, white or black -- we cannot conclude as to the living conditions of a specific group that his house represents.




