Late 19th century

Standing a full two stories in height, this log house is larger than most. It is plain in appearance and has a facade with the typical three bays, arranged in bilateral symmetry. In plan, there are two rooms down and two up. This is one of the few old log houses of a Black family that is still well maintained, and its residents continue to use some of the traditional things -- kerosene lamps, wood burning stoves, and the water pump -- in their daily life.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two story house stands on the top of a hill on the south side of Brink Road not far from Clarksburg. The house is oriented towards the road, and its roofline runs east to west. Around the house are several important old outbuildings. There is a frame meat house, wood-pile, and two privies, and there is even a water pump which is still in use since the occupants do not have running water. Lumber is piled by the meat house and used to fuel the wood burning stove. According to Miss Ethel Foreman, the residents of this house do not have electricity and continue to use kerosene lamps. Wood burning stoves still heat the house. According to Miss Foreman, there were "beautiful vegetable gardens," a grape arbor, and even orchards behind the house in the first half of the 20th century. None of these remain. The area behind the house is simply a lawn.

According to Miss Foreman, this is a log house. Composition material now covers the outside of the house, and the logs cannot be seen. It is hoped that the interior will be investigated when the residents are at home. A description of it will be added at that time. The facade contains three bays with a door centrally located, flanked on either side by two windows, a common arrangement of these modest two story houses in upper western Montgomery County. The windows contain double hung sashes with 2x2 lights. The stove flue descends through the middle of the house. In plan there were probably two rooms downstairs and two rooms upstairs. The western gable ends has no windows nor does the eastern. The eaves are boxed and the roof is covered with galvanized tin. It is not remembered by informants associated with this house how the logs were notched at the corners.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to Miss Ethel Foreman, this is the only log house of a Black family that still stands in the Clarksburg vicinity. She spent many days of her childhood playing with the grandchildren of the owners, and recalls those days:

"Benjamin Wims was a life-long resident of Montgomery County. He walked with a cane and would walk to the school to visit the classes. The black school was where the Clarksburg recreation center now stands. He was a shoe cobbler. You could take a pair of shoes to him and have them half soled. He had a cobbler's bench in the kitchen.

He also liked to plant a vegetable garden. A grape arbor was at the end of the garden: delicious grapes.

As we see the house and grounds today is just about the way it has always looked. It has been kept very very well.

The family is gone, but the grandchildren survive.

I remember when I was a child, I played with Della and Edith. We would play up and down Brink Road and in the yard of the Wims house. Brink Road was a dirt road in those days. Automobiles were rare in those days, and we would watch the cars going along the road every time we saw a pretty car we would call it our car, and we would count the cars. That would be impossible today."

According to the deed JA 3/163 this tract was purchased by Benjamin Wims in 1886 from William T. Doarden. Since the house resembles other log houses built in the late 1800's, it was probably built at that time.
