9. **Description:** The Trundle farm is a complex of 4 buildings: the house & a sandstone outbuilding are on the west side of the road; a bank barn & spring house on the east. The house is 1½ story, of log & frame (now covered by novelty siding), built in sections over a period of years. The north room & lean-to were earliest, of hand hewn timbers mortised together and held in place by pins; there is an exterior fireplace and a 4½' deep cellar. There have been several additions to the original house. There is a porch on the east (front) facade. Near the house is a small sandstone outbuilding with gable roof. Across Martinsburg Rd. is the sandstone & wood bankbarn, one of the finest in the County. The center section of the west facade is recessed. Sandstone quoins, windowsills, & lintels define the structure. A small sandstone springhouse is located southeast of the barn.
10. **Significance:** This farm complex is important for its architecture & for its associations with an early Montgomery County family. Otho Trundle purchased 238 acres of "Wilson's Bad Luck" and constructed his small log house here before 1821. The magnificent stone bank barn was constructed a few years later, possibly by stonemasons employed by the C & O Canal Company. The farm remained in the family until 1884, passing from one Trundle to another through the courts rather than wills. In 1879, the Martinsburg-Dickerson Road was surveyed, dividing the dwelling house from the barn.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Trundle Farm is a complex of four buildings built on the east and west sides of Martinsburg Road: The house and a sandstone outbuilding are on the west side of the road. A bank barn and spring house are on the east side of the road.

The house is one-and-half story rectangular structure of log and frame construction, now covered by novelty siding. Built in sections over a period of years, the north room (now living room) and lean-to (now bed rooms) were apparently the earliest construction. Evidence suggests that this was originally a two-bay log structure with a lean-to at the north end, constructed of hand hewn timbers mortised together and held in place by pins. Beneath this bedrock structure was a 4 1/2' deep cellar. An exterior fireplace was located on the south wall of the structure. Later a room to the south (now dining room) was added and another room, to the west. The west room was used as a kitchen until 1939 when the owners tore it down and added a bay window to take advantage of the view to the west. A third room, added on the south side of the diningroom was added to accommodate a kitchen. At that time the present owners covered the original chimney stack with bricks and constructed a new fireplace for the dining room. The house has a gable roof with raised seam metal covering.

A porch extends across the east (front) elevation and covers the living and dining rooms. The porch has poured concrete foundations and is five square wooden posts which support the flat roof of the porch. The second floor windows are paned two over two light casement windows. The first floor and north lean-to windows are six over six double hung windows. A lean-to addition has recently been added to the south end of the house adjacent to the kitchen. The length of the house from the kitchen to the north lean-to addition is 64'8 1/2".

To the southwest of the house, a short distance away, is a small sandstone outbuilding with a gable roof. The original use of this one room structure is not certain. In the southeast corner are two diagonal shelves constructed of stone and structurally fit into the walls of the building.

Across Martinsburg Road and to the south is the sandstone and wood bankbarn. This structure was constructed to make the best advantage of its site on the slope of a north-south running hillside. The upper floor is accessible from the road (west) and affords bulk storage of hay and straw. The lower level is accessible from the lower fields (east) and provides efficient stable space for farm livestock. On the west side there are two flanking sandstone bays which project forward, the center section is recessed. In this section are two gigantic paired wooden doors which extend the full height of the west facade and are supported by stop hinges. In the northwest door a smaller, man-sized door has been cut to permit easy access to the barn. The gable roof has a steeper pitch on the east side and the roof is covered entirely by corrugated tin. On the east side the upper floor of the barn is cantilevered out and includes a wooden forebay between the stone end walls. Beneath the forebay is a row of stalls for farm livestock.

The stone and wood work of this barn are noteworthy. Sandstone quoils and windowsills and lintels define the structure. Ventilator windows provide ventilation for hay stored in the barn.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

From the year 1816 through the year 1818, Otho Trundle purchased six separate yet contiguous parcels of "Wilson's Bad Luck", with the combined lots enumerated at 238 acres, more or less. These lands, bounded on the west by the Potomac River, formed the majority of Otho Trundle's holdings, and it was upon this portion of "Wilson's Bad Luck" that Otho Trundle constructed the log north end of the existing building, sometime before his death in 1821. [1]

Trundle having died intestate, his heirs petitioned the Montgomery County court system to produce an equitable division of the property. William Trundle, exercising the right of primogeniture, elected to take the whole of the real estate. By the time of the final decree of the court in 1830, the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal had been constructed through the western portions of the Trundle holdings. [2]

William Trundle died intestate on November 9, 1835, and his children again reverted to the courts for a partitioning of their father's property that would be just to all parties entitled. This time, William H. Trundle, being the eldest son of William Trundle, chose as his share the family homestead, now reduced slightly to approximately 235 acres. The court-commissioned surveyance of the property, taken on November 11, 1853, provides the earliest verbal description of the buildings standing upon the Trundle farm. These improvements consisted of;

...a dwelling house, barn, and corn house. The dwelling house is indifferent, the barn is of stone but somewhat out of repair [and] the fencing is very indifferent. [3]

The magnificent stone bank barn, one of the few left standing in Montgomery County, and the corn house appear to have been constructed during William Trundle's ownership of the homestead, ca. 1830.

William H. Trundle died intestate (apparently a family tradition) sometime around 1860, and, in 1865, the various heirs sold their interest in the land to William H. Trundle's brother, James O. Trundle. [4] During his holding of the Trundle homestead, the

present Martinsburg-Dickerson Road was surveyed, on September 26, 1879. Passing the road between the dwelling house and barn of James O. Trundle was believed by the road commissioners "...to be the most practicable route", and the division of Trundle's land in such a manner was done "...with his full consent, saying he would not attempt to defeat the road on that ground." [5] What appears to be the small stone spring house situated southeast of the barn is depicted on the 1879 road plat.

On March 29, 1884, James O. Trundle sold the 235 acres of "Wilson's Bad Luck" to Frederick Miller, thus releasing the old homestead from the Trundle family's ownership. The farm then passed through several hands until 113.15 of the original acres came into the possession of the Wells family on September 18, 1950, [6], where it has remained ever since.

<p>The house is a 1-1/2 story structure of log and framed construction. The log north end has a boxed staircase in the northeast corner leading to the loft space, which is ceiled at the collar level. The present stone center chimney was an external south end chimney with rebuilt fireplace, also opening into the present center room. On the south end is a modern kitchen addition. The north end has a lean-to; an L-wing has been removed. There is a cellar only under the center section</p> <p>The facade shows the additions, having originally been two bays with two bay and three bay additions toward the south. A shed-roofed porch covers the first two sections below the loft windows. The older parts sit on sandstone foundations.</p> <p>A stone outbuilding sits behind the house with a shingled roof. The barn sits to the southeast of the house across Martinsburg Road. It is a bankbarn built of sandstone with recessed doors. The corners have large quoining blocks, openings are spanned by stone lintels. The floor joists are logs with one surface smoothed off, spaced only several feet apart. The roof framing is hand-hewn timbers. Some of the openings have louvered panels in place. The interior walls are stone. A stone spring house sits southeast of the barn.</p>

ACTION TAKEN


