DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This large, two story frame structure was built as the meeting hall for the members of the Love and Charity Society, a local and perhaps statewide sick and burial society. Today the building is no longer used and serves only as a storage facility for cast-off items.

The building is located behind the Martinsburg school. Its facade is oriented toward the south in the direction of the school and White's Ferry Road. The axis of its gable roof runs south-north. The structure is plain in appearance, but is well proportioned. The south gable end serves as the facade, consists of two bays, and contains double doors, placed in the center. They are topped with a horizontal transom. The second floor carries two double hung sash windows with rounded arches. Near the peak of the gable end is a square window for the attic, the window of which is missing.

The building is three bays in depth. The frame was sheathed with weatherboards that are painted gray-blue. Corner boards and window and door trims accent the building and are painted white. The cornices are boxed and carry short returns. A brick stove flue ascends the inside of the east wall near the center of the length.

Since the building was locked, an investigation of the interior was not possible. Views through the windows were obscured by the stuff piled inside the building, so a description of its decorative features was not possible.

According to Lemuel Graham, an 84 year old oral informant from Martinsburg, this building was constructed by a carpenter Scott Bell, the same man who built the Warren M.E. Church in 1903. Bell also constructed the St. Paul's Community Church in Sugarland. (His great grandson, Raymond Bell, lives in Poolesville according to Lemuel Graham and Tilghman Lee from Sugarland, and he ought to be contacted for further details about his ancestor's life as a carpenter and the buildings he constructed.)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This building was one of the principal institutions of the historical Black community: the sick and burial insurance societies that developed indigeneously in the communities so that the people could care for their own in times of need. In addition to being a meeting place for the society members, the building was a center for the community, a place where dramatical performances, lectures, and other community activities took place. For more details of this organization, members of the community such as Lemuel Graham, Evelyn Herbert, and John Thompson ought to be consulted.

During the course of my survey of sites in southern Maryland, I located the Love and Charity Hall in Abell, Md. Since they carried identical names, it is most likely that they were parts of the same statewide organization. Historians of Black communities ought to further investigate these sites to learn more of their development and their role in the historical Black community. This is especially important now since these Black self-help organizations have been superseded by modern, national financial institutions, and these earlier organizations have been abandoned. These two vestiges remain, as perhaps do written records related to them, written records that would be important documents to interpret their history.

According to Graham, this hall was constructed about four or five years before he left to fight in World War I. This puts the date of construction at 1913 or 1914.
