DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Tilghman Lee says that this house was located on the north side of Sugarland Lane at the end of a farm lane that led from the road. It was frame, had two rooms down and two up. Its facade faced the west and had a door and a window. On the north gable end was another door that led to the outside and the outbuildings beyond the house. In the back length (east) there were two windows, one for each room. There was no opening in the south gable end. The two rooms were used as the living room and kitchen downstairs, as was typical, and the upstairs had two bedrooms. A brick stove flue for wood stoves ascended through the middle of the house and served the stoves in each room downstairs.

Lee adds that this frame house may have been built after an earlier log house, that would have been built when Adams purchased the property in 1884.

He also described John Adams as perhaps having been born during slavery, but he did not grow up under slavery like his father, Samuel Lee, Joe Curtis, William Taylor and others.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This two story, frame house that Adam s built after the earlier log house was representative of those built by Black landowners in Montgomery County near the turn of the century. The transition in housing that Tilghman Lee describes for this site exemplies the changes in that period after the Civil War as Blacks acquired land.

The U.S. Census of 1880 for Montgomery County lists John Adams (age 36, therefore born in 1844) with wife Julia (born in 1845). Their children are:

Basil (age 15), (work on farm, occupation).
 John Quincy, 8 }
 Florence, 4 } at home
 William, 2 }

dams' occupation is given as "work on farm". His birthplace was Kentucky, and his wife Julia was from Maryland. Tilgham Lee confirms that Adams' first wife was named Julia, and he adds that he had a second wife named Annie.

According to deed JA 36/395, John Adams purchased this tract from Augustus Webb in 1884. The tract consisted of 18 acres, and the present tract owned by the Sykes (the current owners) is only 2.46 acres of that larger farm owned by Adams. His holding was one of the largest of the Black landowners in Sugarland.


