This one and a half story house contained one room down and one room up and was the residence of a black landowning family in the last decades of the 19th century. Though it was unusually small for a landowning family, it does represent the continuation of early house types from slavery, and the similarity in housing among landless tenants of the 19th century and some small landowners.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This house no longer stands, and there is no visible evidence of it remaining. According to community oral informant William Moore, who was raised on the property adjacent to the Coplin place, and to his mother, Mae Isabelle Owens, who was also raised in the community, this was a small log house with two rooms down and two up. It was similar to the Dennis Hamilton house, the walls of which remain standing. The Coplin house stood on the east side of the north-south continuation of the west portion of Jerusalem Church Road. That continuation has since been abandoned and is grown up in woods. This house faced the road (west) and was located to the southwest of the Hartley Moore house, on the opposite side of the road.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to deed EBP 23/412, this tract of land was purchased by David "Coplin" from Robert Williams in 1881. It was a portion of the 3 1/8 acres that Robert Williams had acquired from Leonidas Jones in 1877, (deed EBP 16/329). That land had once been part of the much larger estate, "Aix-La-Chappelle".

According to William Moore, the current owner of the property, Copeland had purchased one acre from Williams, and another one on the north side of the current Jerusalem Church Rd. from his grandparents, William and Maria Moore. At this stage, research of the deeds has not been completed to verify this, but it is clear that Coplin owned two acres of property, and that his first acquisition was in 1881. This establishes him as one of the founders of the Jerusalem community.

This house is representative of the type often built by small landowning families in the decades after freedom. Such houses were common in the Jerusalem and Jonesville communities and in other Black, as well as white, communities in 19th century Montgomery County. Most of these houses are gone.

According to 1900 U.S. census for Montgomery County (see attached page), David Copeland was born in 1843. He was listed as a widower. Being born in 1843, he was the same age as Wallace Hamilton, and was one of the oldest members of the early Jerusalem community. Further research of the freed slave lists of 1867 in Montgomery County may identify further details about his history.




