This small log house, one and a half stories in height, contained one room down and one room up and had a small frame kitchen attached to the rear length. A cellar was dug below the house. The dwelling was unusually small for a Black land-owning family in this era in Montgomery County; most lived in log or frame houses of two rooms down, two up plan or larger.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This small one and a half story log house stands on the west side of Jerusalem Road, about seventy yards from the road. It faces the east and stands on the slope of a gentle hill. In front of it, at the bottom of the hill runs a small creek. The house is now abandoned, surrounded by woods, and is in derelict condition. Due to the danger involved in entering the house, the interior was not closely inspected.

The facade of the house consisted of two bays, a front door centrally located and a window to the south. Since all the windows and sashes were completely removed, it was not possible to determine the type of window for the house. There appears to have been no front porch. Behind the house (west) a small frame kitchen was built, and has disappeared from view, except for brick rubble from the brick stove flue in the back of the kitchen. It was probably original. The logs of the house were well-chinked, plastered and whitewashed. They were left bare. At the corners, they were secured by V notches. A mixture of pine and oak logs were used.

The interior of the house consisted of one room down and one up. The one room downstairs was low in height, and was not ceiled. The hewn joists were left exposed. On the joists were a number of hooks and pegs from which household things were hung, since there were no closets. There was a rack made of the crooks of two tree limbs, which may have served as a gun rack. There were plank shelves along the walls. The floor had given way and revealed the cellar below. A narrow ladder staircase enclosed with tongue and groove siding and closed by a door (now gone) ascended into the one room upstairs.

The upstairs now contains a closet, several old trunks, a bed, and a lot of clothes and other things left behind. The roof was covered with wood shingles. The rafters were a mixture of sawn and hewn materials. A small window in each gable end illuminated and ventilated the upstairs. A brick stove flue was built into the southeast side of the upstairs. A stove pipe from downstairs ascended into the brick flue which was supported by the joists.

The frames of the front and back doors, the windows, and of the enclosed stairway were fastened with wire nails, and were original to construction.

According to oral informant Beulah Clarke, (the current owner of the property), there was a hen house, hog pen, and meat house behind the house. There was also a well.

Overall, the house is small in size and today is plain to the point of starkness in appearance. It is a carcass now, but in earlier days, its occupants would have given it life, as Jerusalem residents can testify.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to deed JA 60/242, this property of 2.90 acres was purchased by Charles Frank Dorsey from William Wallace Poole in 1897. According to Beulah Clarke, the current owner of the property and knowledgeable community informant, Frank Dorsey with the assistance of his brother George built this house. This was probably soon after Frank purchased it in 1897, but it may have been built several years earlier as the residence for the Dorsey family, and the land only purchased later. Nonetheless, the presence of wire nails in the framing of the windows and doors and the stairway indicate that the house was no earlier than the 1880's, probably in the 1890's, combining this with oral history, the most likely date of construction is near the time of purchase in 1897.

According to Beulah Clarke, this was the home of Frank Dorsey and his wife Mollie Johnson Dorsey. Frank was the brother of George Dorsey and of Leander Dorsey, who married Sam Clarke, another nearby resident.

As part of this survey, a copy of a photograph of Frank and Mollie Dorsey was copied. See photographs.

According to Beulah Clarke, the only son of the Dorseys (Andrew) died at a young age. For the rest of their years, they lived alone in this house. After the death of Mollie Dorsey in this house about 30 years ago, her husband moved in with Noah Clarke until his death. No one has lived in the house since.

According to Beulah Clarke, Frank Dorsey worked as a laborer on the farms in the vicinity.





c. 1900-1925






