This two story, three bay, cross gable frame house is typical of those built around the turn of the century. It was the home of a Negro blacksmith. Behind the house remain the outbuildings that he built. They are still used by the present owner who continues to raise and preserve much of his own food.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two story frame house stands at the end of a long lane leading through another farm. In front of the house is a yard with a large shade maple tree, and beyond the yard is pastureland. By the north gable end is a large fenced hog yard, and behind the house (west) is a series of outbuildings. Behind them is another large pasture, where the old mule of the owner, Charles Moore, has been literally "put out to pasture."

The dwelling itself is like many other houses of black and white landowners of moderate means of the turn of the 20th century: a two story, three bay, cross gable frame house. The weatherboards have been sheathed with composition siding, a porch enclosed along the facade, and a two story addition attached to the back length.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is owned by Charles Moore, who acquired it from the Wims family. Wims had been a blacksmith, according to Moore, and made the strap iron hinges for the carriage house and other out-buildings. Moore himself is from the Jerusalem community, and is the grandson of William Moore, whose house was surveyed there. Moore worked on farms throughout most of his life and continues to farm his own land though now on a more modest scale. He raises cattle, chickens, and hogs. He butchers his own hogs, and cures and stores the meat in the outbuildings behind his house.

As part of this survey, students from Montgomery College participated in a hog butchering with Moore at the home of Clifton Robinson in Jerusalem. Like most blacks in the survey area, Moore has raised hogs since his youth, but is one of the few who continues to do so. He recalled that when he did farm work, feed for his hogs was part of his salary, and that he could have all he wanted. He worked for the Glickman (?) family in Dickerson from 1948 to 1971, and lived on their farm. Now he raises Durock hogs, which don't have a lot of fat, he explained. Years ago, he recalls, he used to raise Hampshire hogs (black and white hogs) because they too had more lean. When queried about the preferences of his parents and other blacks of their generation, he explained that "they raised any kind of hog you could get."

Moore has an important collection of family photographs related to Jerusalem history. He has a large picture of George Dorsey, the carpenter from Jerusalem and of Dorsey's son, William. (See M-27-52-4.) He also has a picture of Annie Hamilton Dorsey, wife of William H. Dorsey and mother of Rosa Dorsey from Jerusalem. These families were among the first generation of Jerusalem landowners.

Moore's wife Henrietta (recently deceased) was the daughter of Wilson Hamilton and was raised in the Dennis Hamilton log house in Jerusalem. Like so many other families located during the course of this survey, this one was deeply connected through historical ties to their community.


