## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The building (which started out as a church, was used as a residence for a period, and has now been converted to a medical center) is a two-story, two bay by one, wood-frame, rectangular building with a steep gable roof; the gable end is toward the street (Germantown Road, Route 118). The eaves are bracketed and a concrete slab attached to the front of the building is what remains of a porch which ran the length of the front facade and which was removed when the building was altered for medical clinic use. The porch was probably added when the church was converted to residential use. The building is now covered in vinyl siding. It sits on a half acre of land near the intersection of Germantown and Clopper Roads.

With the sale of the building for use as a medical clinic two years ago, extensive interior and exterior changes were made to the structure; basically, only the form of the building on the exterior remains unchanged. The interior space was divided into two floors, with examining rooms and a waiting room on the first floor. The second floor (as of October, 1984) is unfinished, but the owner plans to finish it for office use in the near future. (As a church, it was one-story).

In its unfinished state, the original church ceiling and the upper part of the interior walls can still be seen on the second floor. The outlines of the pressed tin used on the ceiling and as molding around the top of the walls (removed during the renovation) can still be seen, along with partial outlines of eight gothic windows (four on each side), covered during the renovation process. The side walls now have only one window apiece, but there are plans to add additional windows. The original center entrance was moved to one side of the front facade, and an additional entrance will be added on one side when offices are created on the second floor. The first floor rooms are panelled, and there is no evidence that the building was ever used as a church.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The building was originally erected in 1902 to serve as a place of worship for part of the congregation of a Methodist Church which, in the mid-1800's, stood on a site on Clopper Road across from the intersection of Clopper and Schaeffer Roads. In 1900, the Clopper Road congregation underwent a North-South division, presumably because of the antagonisms within the congregation caused by the Civil War. The "northern" segment, known as the Methodist Episcopal Church, remained at the Clopper Road building until the early 1900's, when that congregation decided to erect a new church on Germantown Road, in New Germantown (now the Trinity United Methodist Church at 19225 Germantown Road). The "southern" contingent built (in 1902) the building on Germantown Road which is now being used as a medical clinic and used it as a church until the 1930's, when both congregations reunited at the Trinity United Methodist Church.

The M.E. South Church building was used for some years as a residence after the congregation departed. In 1982 it was bought for use as a medical facility. At the time, the building was badly deteriorated and had been condemned by the County for its building code violations.

A cornerstone in the left-hand corner of the side facing Germantown Road is inscribed "M.E. Church South 1902".

The building is significant for its role in Methodist Church history in this area and as a symbol of the deep divisions created by the Civil War.





Clara Jane Crawford Bowman was an ardent Methodist. In 1903, she and her husband, Charles, gave land to build Trinity Methodist Church in Germantown. She was superintendent of the Sunday school for many years. For her continuous service to the church, she was awarded a lifetime membership in the Methodist Women's Society; she wore the pin for the rest of her life and was buried with the single adornment on her black dress. Germantown Methodists first worshipped together in a log chapel on the east side of Clopper Road at Route 118. But the membership divided in 1902, and some of them built Trinity Methodist Church, a mile farther east, near the railroad tracks. Others built Methodist Episcopal Church South in Old Germantown, pictured here. Like the log chapel, it was built on Route 118 near Clopper Road.

This church and the Germantown Presbyterian churches were later converted into dwellings and yet again rehabilitated as office spaces. The Methodist log chapel's adjoining graveyard still remains. Courtesy of Idella Leaman
