The Grusendorf Log House is located right next to the Seneca Creek State Park headquarters off of Clopper Road in the Clopper Lake Day Use Area. The Log House is constructed of hand hewn logs with the wide gaps filled in with chinking and white mortar that is set upon a fieldstone foundation. The entire structure, which is rather small at just 21 feet by 18 feet 6 inches, is covered by a wood shingle roof. In front (the south facade) a door is located directly in the center of the house flanked on either side by a window. The only other opening is a door located to the rear of the house (north facade). In keeping with the rustic nature of the house the trim that surrounds the doors and windows is very minimal and undecorated.

9. Description: This is a log and frame house: log (east) is three bays, one-and-a-half stories; frame (west) is five bays, two-and-a-half stories. Log has exposed walls with A-V notches and chinked with fieldstone and clay. Frame has white asphalt shingles. The south porch has a flat roof supported by four square posts; porch is enclosed by balustraded railing. Two-over-two double-hung windows. There is one small window in east, west, and north gable ends. Both houses have gable roofs -- the log house roof is in poor condition and covered by black asbestos shingles. The frame house has gray asbestos shingles.

10. Significance: The Grusendorf house, owned by the same German immigrant family for 3/4 of a century, is significant as one of the few structures remaining in the area known as "Old Germantown".

Germantown appears to have been named after the several families of German ancestry who settled nearby, among them Snyders, Grusendorfs, Metztes, Richters, and Stangs. Jacob Snyder was the first of these, settling in the area in 1832. After building the log section of this house, he sold it in 1860 to Hanna and Frantz Grusendorf. Grusendorf was a stonemason and his wife a midwife. Hanna continued to occupy the house until her death in 1902, and their daughter, Mary Augusta Marth, lived there until her death in 1931. It was sold to Bertha R. Dunn in 1933, and deeded to the present owner, Jean C. Dunn Richelsen, in 1971.

"Old Germantown" itself by the mid 1860s was a busy village of shops, a Methodist church, and houses, but in 1873 the Metropolitan Branch of the B&O Railroad was built about 1 1/2 miles east. As business area grew up around the railroad station and mill, "Germantown Station" replaced the older village as a market center.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Dunn Log House is a three bay, one-and-a-half story, log (east) house attached to a five bay, two-and-a-half story, L-shaped frame (west) house.

Both east and west sections are built on fieldstone foundations. The west section has white asphalt shingles. The east section has exposed A-V notched logs chinked with fieldstone and clay. There is a porch on the south (front) elevation of the frame house with a flat roof supported by four square wooden posts. The porch is enclosed by a balustraded railing. The south double glass and wooden paneled doors are surmounted by a four light transom. The north and south doors on the log house are wooden paneled. On the north elevation there is a two story porch which is semi-enclosed at both the first and second levels.

There are two-over-two double-hung windows in the frame house. There is one small window opening in the east, west, and north gable ends of the frame house. The windows in the log house are covered by plywood sheets.

Both the log and frame houses have gable roofs. The log house has black asbestos shingles, the frame house has grey asbestos shingles and a boxed and returned cornice line. There are three interior chimneys on the east, west, and north gable ends of the frame house.

The south door opens into a central hallway in the frame house. An open string single run stairway ascends from south to north. It has a turned newel post and balustered railing. East of the hall is the living room and west is the dining room. Kitchen is in the north ell.

The house was modernized several years ago. The floors are narrow hardwood and are covered by linoleum and wall to wall carpeting. The walls and ceilings are plaster over lath and some plasterboard. There are molded door frames and wooden paneled doors. There is a stove in the living room.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Grusendorf house, owned by the same German immigrant family for three-quarters of a century, is significant as one of the few structures remaining in the area known as "Old Germantown".

Germantown appears to have been named after the several families of German ancestry who settled nearby. Jacob Snyder was the first of these, settling in 1832. (He had previously lived in Steptown (Middlebrook). The other Germans, some related, were the Grusendorfs, Metzses, Richters, and Stangs. John Brewer, trustee, sold 12 3/4 acres to Jacob F. Snider (sic) in 1855,¹ and on this land Snyder probably built the original log part of the house. In 1860 he sold it to Hanna and Frantz Grusendorf, although the deed was not recorded until 1866.² The Grusendorfs were living at this location in 1865.³ According to his descendants, Grusendorf was a stonemason who built the foundations and walls of many houses in the -ermantown area. His wife, Hanna, was a midwife.

By the mid 1860s Old Germantown, the area near the intersection of present Routes 118 and 117, was a busy village of shops, a Methodist church and houses. In 1873 the Metropolitan Branch of the B&O Railroad came through the county about 1 1/2 miles east. A mill and railroad station were built near the railroad, and a business area grew up around these industries. Old Germantown residents moved closer to the railroad, and "Germantown Station" replaced the older village as a market center.

Hanna Grusendorf continued to occupy the house until her death in 1902. Their daughter, Mary Augusta Marth, widow of Fredric Marth, lived there until her death in 1931. Emelia Marth Carter sold it to Bertha R. Dunn in 1933.⁴ David M. Dunn deeded it to the present owner in 1971. According to a Grusendorf descendant, Daniel Leaman, the Dunns, Grusendorf and Marths were all related. Leaman and his parents remain near the old town of Germantown.

Today the shops, church and most of the houses are gone from Old Germantown; the Grusendorf house is one of the few that remains.
