 This three bay by four bay, one and a half story rectangular church is no longer in use. It faces south and has white clapboarded exterior walls. On the south elevation there is a three-tiered tower. The bottom section is the largest, and the top section is the smallest. A tympanum window surmounts the south (front) door. There are two over two double hung lancet windows. The gabled roof has black asbestos shingles.
10. Significance: McDonald Chapel is significant as a typical small community church in the vernacular style. Around the end of the 19th century, members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the area of Quince Orchard gathered to organize a Sunday School. By 1901 the congregation had grown to a sufficient size to warrant the erection of a proper house of worship. Land was donated by John Higdon, and construction of the chapel was begun in 1902, under the direction of Rev. William A. McDonald, pastor of the Gaithersburg Circuit. However, Rev. McDonald died before the chapel was completed, and when the new 250-seat church was dedicated in 1903, it was in his memory. The Chapel Trustees filed for incorporation in 1906, and the deed was formally conveyed to them the following year. The Chapel enjoyed a healthy congregation and leadership as one of the 5 churches on the Gaithersburg Circuit. However, by the 1960s, a declining membership forced a merger with Hunting Hill Methodist Church; the new church was renamed "Fairhaven Methodist Church". The consolidated churches eventually abandoned McDonald Chapel, and it was sold out of the congregation in 1973.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

McDonald Chapel was originally constructed to service the small community of Quince Orchard. The church is situated on approximately one acre of land that was granted by John Higdon, on October 24, 1901 to the Trustees of the Gaithersburg Methodist Episcopal Church, South.¹ Around this time, at the end of the 19th century, John W. Briggs organized a small Sunday school for the benefit of the families in and around Quince Orchard. Yet, by the year 1902, the congregation had grown to a sufficient size to warrant the erection of a proper house of worship. The congregation then attached itself to the Gaithersburg Circuit of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (established by the Baltimore Conference in 1887).² Construction of the chapel was begun in 1902, under the auspices of the Reverend William A. McDonald, pastor of the Gaithersburg Circuit. However, Rev. McDonald died prior to the completion of the chapel, and the enterprise was taken over by the Rev. T.J. Lambert, the new pastor of the church.

The new church at Quince Orchard was dedicated on May 8, 1903, in memory of Rev. McDonald. The Montgomery County Sentinel reported the opening of McDonald Chapel thusly:

Between 400 and 500 people were in attendance. The services were conducted by Rev. T.J. Lambert, of Gaithersburg, pastor of the church. Rev. J.P. Stump, of Alexandria, Virginia, preached the dedicatory sermon. Forest Oak Church choir, of Gaithersburg, rendered a special program of music. Mr. Wilson Walker was director and Mrs. R.P.W. Jones, organist... At the morning service, Dr. Stump, through the liberality of the people, raised the sum of \$500 to complete the fund for the payment of the church, which is valued at \$1,500.³

The building itself was described as;

...a new frame structure of gothic architecture, with vestibule and belfry, and has a seating capacity of two hundred and fifty.⁴

On February 11, 1906, the members of McDonald Chapel, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, assembled at the church for the purpose of incorporation. Then and there did they elect Samuel T. Briggs, James

Small, John E. Clagett, George H. Clagett and Newton C. Price as the first trustees of the chapel.⁵ And, as a consequence of the act of incorporation, Rev. Lambert, in his capacity as President of the Gaithersburg Methodist Episcopal Church, South, conveyed the deed for the one acre of land on which the church stands to the newly formed trustees of the McDonald Chapel, on January 18, 1907.⁶

The church enjoyed a healthy congregation and strong leadership as one of the five churches of the Gaithersburg Circuit. (The other four member churches were the parent Grace Church, erected in 1905 as a replacement to Forest Oak, Darnestown, Travilah, and Germantown.) However, by the 1960's, a declining membership forced the congregation into a merger with the Hunting Hill Methodist Church. (Hunting Hill Methodist Church was constructed in 1903, at the same time as McDonald Chapel.⁷ While not originally of the southern persuasion, the divided Methodist bodies were formally reunited in 1939.) The two churches drew up the articles of merger on July 20, 1965, and the congregation renamed itself "Fairhaven Methodist Church".⁸ The consolidated churches eventually abandoned McDonald Chapel, and the Fairhaven Methodist Church, as successors to the trustees of McDonald Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church, South, sold the building to Ivano Domestici and Carlo Marcantonio on December 18, 1973.⁹

The main body of the church has pointed windows, the lower sash of which have paper applied to look like lace. The cornice returns into the gable ends.</p>
