Description: This stone and frame structure was built in three sections: the two and a half story stone section faces north; it is joined on the south by a two and a half story frame section; east of both sections is a one story frame lean-to addition. The north (front) porch has a flat roof supported by four square chamfered wooden posts. There area nine-over-six double-hung windows at the first level and six-over-six double-hung windows elsewhere in this and the two frame sections. Gable roofs have raised seam metal covering. The east lean-to has a shed roof with asbestos covering.

"1823" is scratched on the north facade of the stone section to the east of the front door; it is now hidden by ivy.

A log meat house sits east of the house. The logs have inverted V-notching. The stone springhouse is south of the house; it has frame gable ends. A breezeway now connects it with the main house. A double corncrib is framed with hewn members mortised, tenoned, and pegged together. The bankbarn is framed above a stone foundation; it is 20th century. A stable and carriage house are sheathed with board and batten siding; the framing is sawn and nailed.

10. Significance: Crow's Content is significant for its association for several generations with the prominent Griffith family of upper Montgomery County. When Henry Griffith purchased 572 acres in 1812, there may have been a small dwelling on the property, but the present stone house was constructed by him in 1823, according to the date scratched on the front facade.

Henry Griffith's son Uriah inherited his plantation, slave, and shotgun in 1836. Uriah was the collector of the Port of Baltimore before he retired to "Crow's Content". He had four children, Uriah H. II, Henry H. II, Thomas C. and Matilda O. Griffith.

Sons Henry II and Uriah II successfully operated a cattle business for many years and were well known at the Rockville Fair as exhibitors and winners of many blue ribbons for their fine draft horses. Uriah brought sheep from the west to sell in Montgomery County, and Henry is credited with introducing Aberdeen Angus cattle into the county. Thomas Cranmer Griffith was a merchant in Laytonsville and a director of the Savings Institution of Sandy Spring. Henry II purchased the stone house with 190 1/2 acres from his siblings in 1906.

When Henry Griffith II died in 1951, his 220.3 acres were left to his wife, who lived there until her death in 1964. The house is now owned by Mrs. Griffith's niece.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This stone and frame structure was built in three sections: the two and a half story stone section faces north and is joined on the south (rear) elevation by a two and a half story frame section. East of these two sections is a one story frame lean-to addition.

The uncoursed rubblestone section is three bays across and two bays deep. The north (front) porch has a flat roof which is supported by four square chamfered wooden posts. There is a decorative railing about the porch. The north (front) door is paneled and set into a paneled door surround and surmounted by a three light transom. There are nine-over-six double-hung windows at the first level and six-over-six double-hung windows elsewhere in the stone section. First story windows have stone lintels. There are two small ventilator windows at the east and west gable ends. This section of the house has a gable roof covered by raised seam metal covering. There are two interior brick end chimneys at the east and west gable ends.

The south frame section is three bays across and has a clapboarded exterior. Three steps lead to the west wooden paneled door. Windows on this section are irregularly placed and are six-over-six double-hung. This section also has a gable roof covered by raised seam metal. There is an interior brick stove chimney in this section.

The east one-story lean-to addition has novelty siding. It has paired and single six-over-six double-hung windows. The shed roof is covered by asbestos roofing.

A log meat house sits east of the house. The logs have inverted V-notching. The stone springhouse is south of the house; it has frame gable ends. A breezeway now connects it with the main house.

A double corncrib is framed with hewn members mortised, tenoned, and pegged together. The bankbarn is framed above a stone foundation; it is twentieth century. A stable and a carriage house are sheathed with board and batten siding; the framing is sawn and nailed.

On the interior, two rooms and a central hall with stairway face front, with two rooms and a porch to the rear. On the second floor are four bedrooms and two baths. The attic contains two finished rooms. "1823" is scratched on the north facade of the stone section to the east of the front door; it is now hidden by ivy.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Crow's Content is significant for its association for several generations with the prominent Griffith family of upper Montgomery County.

Henry Griffith in 1812 purchased 572 acres and 34½ square perches from Basil Brook for \$5,826; this property included parts of "Addition to Brooke Grove", "Resurvey on Brooke Park", "Fairhill" and "Crow's Content".¹ There may have been a dwelling on the property at the time of purchase, but the present stone dwelling was constructed by Griffith in 1823, according to the date scratched on the front facade.

Henry Griffith's son, Uriah, inherited the "plantation on which I now dwell" as well as my "negro man Isaac, my shotgun and all accoutrements thereunto..." in 1836.² Uriah was the collector of the Port of Baltimore before he retired to "Crow's Content". He had four children, Uriah H. II, Henry H. II, Thomas C. and Matilda O. Griffith.

Sons Henry II and Uriah II successfully operated a cattle business for many years and were well known at the Rockville Fair as exhibitors and winners of many blue ribbons for their fine draft horses. Uriah brought sheep from the west to sell in Montgomery County, and Henry is credited with introducing Aberdeen Angus cattle into the county. Thomas Cranmer Griffith was a merchant in Laytonsville and a director of the Savings Institution of Sandy Spring.³ Henry II purchased the stone house with 190½ acres from his siblings in 1906.⁴

When Henry H. Griffith II died in 1951, the inventory of his property included 220.3 acres of land (12.3 acres wooded, 208 acres tillable and pastureland), a stone and frame 10-room farmhouse, two tenant houses, bank barn and cattle shed, garage and shop, cornhouse, wagon shed, and cement silo.⁵ The property was left to his wife Alice Bartlett Griffith, who continued to live at Crow's Content with her sister until her death in 1964. Crow's Content passed to Mrs. Griffith's niece, and since that time the dwelling has been rented.

Crows Content

THIS very neat stone house located a half-mile east of Laytonsville on the road to Unity, was built in 1823 according to the date cut into the stone front. This is another example of the many rugged houses in our Old Home Series. It has belonged to the Griffith family ever since it was built by Henry Griffith, I, who was born Sept. 22, 1793. He married Lucretia Ober (born Jan. 18th, 1806), of "Rolling Ridge" on Sept. 7, 1824, when she was 18 years old.

The land was from parts of Addition To Brooke Grove, a grant of 7,906 acres, made to James Brooke, Sept. 22, 1762.

The children of Henry I, and Lucretia were Uriah I, born 1825, Albin, born 1828, and Lucretia, born Feb. 1, 1829. Uriah, I, married on Nov. 11, 1846, Henrietta Wilcoxon, and the children of this union were 11 in number. The ones we are most concerned with are the third child, Uriah, II, born Nov. 21, 1857, and Henry, II, born Jan. 15, 1862. These two sons were active in the county for many years, Henry, II, having lived to be 89 years of age. His widow, who was Alice Bartlett, continues in 1961 to occupy the old home with her sister, Vashti R. Bartlett. These spry old ladies still find much in life to be pleased with, their memories softening the problems of this generation. They spend the cold months in Florida, and return each spring to the comfortable house in summer and to early scenes and memories. They have spent the winters in Florida for fifty years.

One other brother of the Griffith sons of Uriah Henry Griffith and Henrietta Wilcoxon was Thomas Cramner, born April 14, 1866, who is recalled by the family as a merchant with a store in Laytonsville and as a Director of the Savings Institution of Sandy Spring.

From a friend of the family it is learned that Uriah, I, was Collector of the Port of Baltimore before he retired to Crows Content, and his son, Uriah II, started into the cattle business with his brother, Henry II. They were very successful for many years and widely known in the farmers' trade down to recent years. Henry II is credited with introducing Aberdeen Angus cattle into Montgomery County. This pair of brothers was well known at the Rockville Fair in the Gay Nineties as exhibitors and winners of many blue ribbons for their fine breed of draft horses.

They owned one beautiful race horse, Harry Bashaw, a fast trotter which the author recalls seeing in sulky races at the Fair. This beautiful animal was the sire of several colts at Rock Spring. Especially dear to the author as a boy was a sorrel colt, which he broke to harness and drove around the neighborhood (in a two-wheeled buggy) to see "his girls" and to school at Sherwood. But this dear young horse, named Buck, was sold by his young owner for \$50.00 when the latter became ambitious to go to Swarthmore.

Frequent other contacts the Rock Spring farmers had with the Crows Content dealers were trips there every August to replace the old ewes with new stock. We then dealt with Uriah II, who bought sheep from the West, had them shipped to the nearest station on the B & O R.R., and brought to the Griffith farm to be offered for sale.

My father's diary, which he kept up for 50 years, tells of annual trips to Laytonsville in his buggy with one of us sons to buy ewes. In 1892 he bought 70 @ \$4.00 each; in 1893 bought 70 at \$3.70 each; and in 1895 bought 100 @ \$2.90 each. I can see the flock scampering out the front gate from Griffiths' amid a cloud of dust which never let up for the three or four hours it took us to drive them 12 or 15 miles to

Rock Spring, each of us taking turns to walk along and then ride with father in the buggy. No autos on the roads then as a serious hazard!!!!

The acreage of this farm when purchased by the Griffith family was, and it has remained, for many years more than 250 acres. The land is generally level, has been well cared for, and kept productive by the presence in its economy of many head of stock, horses, cattle, and sheep grazing the well-fenced fields.

The house is compact and convenient, and has changed little in recent years except to provide space for a tenant in part of the rear. As one enters the front hall he sees the steep stairs in front (first floor ceilings are ten feet high). The parlor is on the right, dining room on left. Adjoining the latter was a side porch, now enclosed. Back of the main rooms are another dining room, kitchen and porch. On the second floor are four bedrooms and two baths. The attic is finished up with two rooms.


NO. 24 E-3 BY A. DARNELL CA. 1750 STONE AND LOGS

THE ancient rambling, picturesque structure shown above is undoubtedly one of the oldest houses in upper Montgomery County. On a tract now being operated as a model dairy farm with a modern new concrete barn, the new and the old features of the place are in striking contrast. The antique building shown above, with a two-story stone slave quarter to be seen at the extreme right of the photograph, seems out of place in Montgomery County. It looks more like some of the cottages to be seen in the hills and valleys of Ireland or Scotland hundreds of years ago. And yet, in spite of its great age, it is a happy and comfort-

able home, with modern conveniences, for a large family.

Located on the north side of the roadway from Dawsonville to Poolesville, it can be seen in a pretty valley of the Little Seneca Creek which meanders through the 257 acre farm. It is about two miles beyond Dawsonville, four miles southeast of Poolesville and thirty-five miles from the Zero milestone. The land for generations has been owned by the Darnell and Dyson families, prominent in upper Montgomery County since before the Revolution.


