The importance has been diminished by a 1942 Colonial Revival style remodeling and the house's subsequent sheathing with modern aluminum siding in the 1970s.

The Gallagher-McDonald is a remodeled two and one-half story frame double pile house on approximately quarter acre lot off Gilmoure Road in Silver Spring. The house is side-gabled and has a traditional Georgian plan. The walls are clapboard (now completely sheathed with aluminum siding) and the roof is covered with composition shingle. The ground plan is a simple rectangle with one-story shed roof wings. The present center hall double-pile core was built ca. 1868 and later remodeled in 1942 as a Colonial Revival house.

Today the principle elevation of the house faces east toward Gilmoure Road (the main facade of the house was re-oriented from the west facing Old Bladensburg Road [University Boulevard] in 1942) and has a symmetrical three-bay facade with flanking one-story shed-roofed additions. The entry is simple without a transom or sidelights and is covered by an enclosed pedimented frame porch. The flanking first floor and second story windows of the main three-bay facade are rectangular and have double-hung sash with six-over-six lights and louvered shutters. The center bay windows on the second floor differ in that they have narrower four-over-four sash. Each wing on the east has one central six-over-six window. This window design--a rectangular, double hung sash with six-over-six lights--is repeated in the same symmetrical pattern on the west elevations and largely throughout the remaining wall surfaces of the gable end and side wing facades of the house. The entry on the west facade (the original front of the house) has been enriched with a segmental arched frontispiece with fluted pilasters. A simple entry accesses the north one-story wing.

Summary: The Gallagher farmhouse built about 1868 by John Barnes has minimal architectural significance as an example of a late nineteenth century vernacular house type. The importance has been diminished by a 1942 Colonial Revival style remodeling and the house's subsequent sheathing with modern aluminum siding in the 1970s.

The present remodeled building has lost integrity of design and materials and no longer represents a distinctive example of a type, period or method of design or construction. The house does reflect changing tastes of domestic architecture in Montgomery county during its rapid transition from a predominantly rural to an urbanized community during the first half of the twentieth century.<sup>1</sup> However, there several other structures in eastern Montgomery County (Atlas Sites #15-51 Drayton, #28-27 Harding House and #32-6 Brunett House) that retain a higher degree of integrity from the period of their Neoclassical remodeling and have stronger associations with the county's domestic architectural transition from traditional farmhouse to modern suburban dwelling.

Chain of Title/Owner Information:

John Barnes purchased 38 1/4 acres of land, referred to as the "Labrinth," from Hayes and Hannah Speakman in 1868 and soon thereafter erected the farmhouse. With his death in 1876, the property was offered for sale by the county court and was described as a tract of land with a frame dwelling, a log dwelling, stable, granary, wagon shed, corn house, hay shed and other unnamed outbuildings. Only the frame dwelling is extant. John McKinley purchased the farm in 1881 from the court for \$1,912.50. Within a decade McKinley sold the house for \$6,000 to James Gallagher (1891), the grandfather of the current owner Sarah McDonald. McKinley retained ownership of the farm and orchards, which later were subdivided into the McDonald Knolls development.

This is an attractive, two-story frame farmhouse that has been remodeled, but retains its original lines. A three-bay facade, with central door, faces east, and the door has a transom-light. A newer, "Greek Revival" architrave with pilasters surrounds the door here. Windows are old, 6/6 frames, except for the middle windows at the second story level-these are unusual, 2/2 sash. There is another small, 2/2 window in the north gable-end. Another unusual feature at this end is the use of weatherboard soffits where the roof overhangs. There is a brick chimney within the end wall here. Siding is German. Inside, the house has a central stair with "parlors" on either side. There are wainscote panels around the lower walls.

The Gallagher farmhouse is significant as an example of rural vernacular architecture typical of that constructed in Montgomery County from the mid-nineteenth through the early twentieth centuries. The house was probably built by John Barnes about 1868.<sup>1</sup> The house was built on 38 1/4 acres of a tract of land referred to as "Labyrinth" which he purchased in June of 1868 from Hayes and Hannah Speakman.<sup>2</sup> This was the smaller of two tracts owned by Barnes (and was probably tenanted out). When he died in 1876, the property was put up for sale by a court appointed trustee. The property was at this time improved by a frame dwelling, a log dwelling, stable, granary, wagon shed, corn house, hay shed and other outbuildings. It was purchased in November of 1881 by John McKinley for \$1912.50.<sup>3</sup>

In August of 1890, the McKinleys sold the house to Lucy Morgan for \$3744.00.<sup>4</sup> Lucy sold it in November of 1891 to James Gallagher, the grandfather of the present owner, Sarah McDonald, for \$6000.00.<sup>5</sup> James died six months after buying the house but his family kept the property, running a farm and orchards.<sup>6</sup> In June of 1917 the Gallaghers conveyed the house to Sarah McDonald, James' granddaughter.<sup>7</sup> In 1942, the McDonalds converted the porches to either side of the house into the single story additions which appear on the house today.<sup>8</sup> This is one of the few remaining old houses in this area now surrounded by sub-divisions and commercial property. The sub-division which now surrounds is named McDonald Knolls after the present owners.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The present owners, the McDonalds, are the grandchildren of Mr. Gallagher, who bought the house with 40 acres at an auction over 100 years ago. He was told the house was old at that time. Mr. Gallagher had lived in Washington, and died not long after buying the place. The subdivision here-McDonald Knolls-was named for this family. This, with the Reed House nearby, is certainly one of the very few old homes remaining in this heavily-developed area. Almost entirely surrounded by commercial-use property.
