Description

The A. A. Randall House is a two-and-one-half story front-gabled frame dwelling. Entrance is in the third bay of the three-bay east gable front; this facade is sheltered by a one-story shed-roof porch with turned bracketed posts, currently screen-enclosed. The original wood siding is now covered with red "bricktex" asphalt shingle. The plain wood cornice is not returned; it is painted white, as is all other trim. Windows are 6/6 and have plain board surrounds painted white. A small diamond-shaped loft window lights the upper gable on the main facade.

Significance

The A. A. Randall House is an important component in the black community of North Brentwood; it is representative of the front-gabled dwellings which were built on subdivision lots at the turn of the twentieth century. It was built in 1895 for the family of Augustus A. Randall, son of Henry Randall, the first purchaser of lots in what was to become North Brentwood. In 1891 Henry Randall purchased several lots in the newly platted Holladay Company's Addition to Highland, and his large dwelling was built the next year. Within a few years four more dwellings were built on nearby lots for members of Randall's extended family, one of them for the family of Augustus A. Randall. These were the only five dwellings shown on the 1896 plat of this area; because members of the family were the first residents, the community was for many years known as Randalltown. Augustus Randall's house is significant as a good representative of the popular front-gabled house form, and also for its association with the Randall family.



The A. A. Randall House is an important component in the black community of North Brentwood; it is representative of the front-gabled dwellings which were built on many subdivision lots at the turn of the twentieth century. It was built in 1895 for the family of Augustus A. Randall, son of Henry Randall, the first purchaser of lots in what was to become North Brentwood. Henry Randall of Anne Arundel County purchased several lots in 1891 in the newly platted Holladay Company's Addition to Highland, and his large dwelling (of I-House form) was built the next year. Within a few years four more dwellings were built on nearby lots for members of Randall's extended family, one of them for the family of his son, Augustus. These were the only five dwellings shown on the 1896 plat of this area; because members of the family were the first residents, the community was for many years known as Randalltown.

Augustus Randall purchased lot 3 in block 21 in 1895, and had the subject house built; it was almost directly behind (west of) his father's house, fronting on Highland Avenue. Augustus Randall worked for the Department of the Treasury; his wife was Maggie Hawkins, daughter of Gasaway Hawkins who had served in the U. S. Colored Troops during the Civil War. Randall's house is significant as a good representative of the popular front-gabled house form, and also for its association with the Randall family.
